Please help me think of ideas to bring people together on Sundays, while we don't have a minister, which meet these requirements: Have fun, learn something, share something, and is of general interest to our Sangha of different ages.

Mahalo: Thank you to Susan Shirota, Lisa Ciriako and Dean Uemura, for chairing the Farewell Luncheon for Rev. Shoji and Dr. Sandra Matsumoto. Colin Byars as MC of the event did a fantastic job in keeping the program moving with humor. Thank you to Rev. Jiko Nakade (Daifukuji Soto Mission) and Rev. Masaaki Miyazaki (Kona Koyasan Daishiji Mission) for their presence at the Bodhi Service and luncheon. More than 180 members, friends, representatives from Affiliate Organizations and community groups were present to express appreciation and to bid farewell to Rev. Shoji and Dr. Sandra. Also present were Bodhi Day guest speaker, Rev. Ryoso Toshima and Alton Miyamoto, Hawaii Kyodan President.

Ministerial Services: Rev. Kosho Yagi is president of the Hawaii Island Ministers for 2013. Rev. David Fujimoto will be president for 2014. As approved by Bishop Eric Matsumoto, they will be assisting Kona Hongwanji with ministerial services until a new resident minister is appointed. Arrangements have been made for funeral, memorial and Sunday services.

Pre-School: After more than 30 years as Director of our Pre-School, Ms. Elsie Tom has retired. Ms. Nancy Grant has been hired as the new Director effective December 16, 2013. We thank Ms. Elsie in establishing a sound foundation and solid reputation for the Kona Hongwanji Pre-School. The very low enrollment this school year affected the financial stability of the school. The KHBT Board of Directors approved expanding the school to admit 2 year old children who are not toilet trained. Prior to her appointment as Director, Ms. Grant was hired as a Consultant to Ms. Elsie to develop policies and procedures for 2 year olds who will be in diapers. Also the need to rearrange class rooms to accommodate 2, 3, and 4 year olds. We anticipate welcoming 2 year old children in diapers in mid-January of 2014.

New Columbarium Hours: Until a new resident minister is assigned, the new Columbarium hours are 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. daily, and will be closed on holidays. Special arrangements for out of town visitors may be made thru the church office. Volunteers are needed to close the Columbarium on weekends. Leave your name at the church office.

Volunteers needed: In the absence of a resident minister, additional volunteers are needed in many areas. Request from BWA President Carol Kawachi: Help is needed on Omigaki days. Especially men who can assist in removing and putting back altar ornaments. Other areas include helping at funeral, memorial and Sunday Services. Training will be provided in all areas. Contact the church office at 323-2993 to help.

Cherry Blossom Festival: We are again participating in the Annual Cherry Blossom Festival on Saturday, February 1, 2014 in Waimea. Morris will need help at 8:00 a.m., and Jr. YBA needs help in the demonstration of the pounding and making mochi at 9:00 a.m. Proceeds from this event will be put into the Educational Fund for Dharma School and Jr. YBA students.

Holidays of Light

As I write this, Thanksgiving, Black Friday, Cyber Monday, and even Hanukkah are past, and Bodhi Day is right around the corner. Yet, about this time every year, Fox News claims that everyone has declared "War on Christmas" just because Wal-Mart greets us with "Happy Holidays" instead of "Merry Christmas," thereby persecuting Christians everywhere.

However there are, and always have been, almost too many holidays around this time of year to count. We Buddhists, of course, celebrate Bodhi Day each December 8 to commemorate the enlightenment of Shakyamuni Buddha, who got the whole ball rolling. On December 21, Zuni and Hopi peoples begin the nine day ceremony of Soyal, Hindus begin the five day festival of Pancha Ganapati, celebrating Lord Ganesha, Persians celebrate Yalda, and the Chinese celebrate the Dongzhi Festival. Christmas is celebrated all over the world on December 25, but in many cultures it just kicks off the Twelve Days of Christmas, which ends with the Feast of the Epiphany on January 6. Many parts of the old British Empire celebrate Boxing Day on December 26, when many African-Americans also begin the seven days of

Kwanzaa. Every country celebrates New Year's Eve and Day, with the song "Auld Lang Syne" coming from the Scottish festival of Hogmanay. In Hawaii, we celebrate the Chinese New Year too.

Of course, this is really the biggest time of the year for those who care about nothing but making, or spending, money. Black Friday in America is the peak of the shopping season which now begins in late August and tapers off in mid-December. When I was growing up in Minnesota, Christmas shopping began in mid-December and nobody put up a tree until Christmas Eve. Then the feasting and visiting would last into early January. Now it seems like everyone is sick of the whole thing by December 20 and the tree goes out into the trash sometime between then and Christmas Day.

Many of these holidays have religious roots, but surprisingly, none of them are the biggest holiday of any religion. To Japanese Buddhists, the Obon Season and even Hoonko are more important than Bodhi Day. For Jews, Hanukkah is a very minor holiday compared with Passover or the Day of Atonement. Christianity began with the first Easter, and much, much later church authorities put a thin veneer of Christianity over the many pagan holidays celebrating the winter solstice. Christmas was not a big deal to the English until Victorian times. The Germans and Scandinavians celebrated it more, but the gift-giving was done on the feast days of St. Lucia and St. Nicholas earlier in December. During the Protestant Reformation, Martin Luther pushed gift-giving to the birthday of Jesus.

So if this time of year is not really all that important to the major religions, why is it celebrated everywhere on earth? Simple. December 21 is the Winter Solstice, and there are more holidays on or around that day than any other. Ancient humans saw the sun weaken all through the autumn. Crops stopped growing and animals began to starve. They were never sure the sun wouldn't continue dwindling until there was nothing but a permanent cold night, with all life dying out. They watched the sky apprehensively, and learned that the days never got any shorter than on December 21. Of course, they didn't know it was December 21. That date is a product of a Roman calendar. But they knew the sun was coming back, that light would return, that crops would eventually grow again and animals and humans would be born and live.

Notice how many of the holidays around this time of the year evoke images of light. On Bodhi Day, Shakyamuni Buddha achieved enLIGHTenment. During Hanukkah, a lamp with a day's worth of oil miraculously stayed aLIGHT for eight days. The Persian celebration of Yalda marked the birth of Mithras, a sun god. Some think the early Christians ripped off the whole story of Mithras' birth and used it for the birth of the Son of God, which sounds a lot like sun god. The ancient Romans celebrated all the sun gods from throughout their vast empire on December 25 during the Festival of the Birth of the Unconquered Sun. Maybe that's how the early Christians managed to combine the story of Mithras with that of Jesus.

Religions even moved historical dates around to bring holidays closer to the winter solstice and the return of the sun. Jesus was actually born in the summer, if the biblical story about the shepherds out watching their flocks by night is correct. By December 25, flocks in Israel have to be inside or they would freeze. Likewise, by all historical accounts, Shakyamuni Buddha sat under the Bodhi tree in the full moon of the fourth month of the Indian calendar, May or June by our calendar. Early Christians and Buddhists moved these holidays to coincide with the festivals of the returning light that people were already celebrating.

So no, nobody has declared a "War on Christmas." The holiday season was never owned by Christmas in the first place, but by the countless "holy days" celebrated around the world through the centuries. We should not think about our differences during this time of the year, but of the hope and joy that unites us all. The sun is beginning to return, which means more to the people in the northern latitudes than to those in the tropics. Spring will come again. There will be light. There will be life. All people, especially those who put their faith in the Buddha of Infinite Light and Life, should celebrate this time of the year that truly makes us all one.
