One is born through the conditions of parentage. The body is nourished by food, its maturity by teaching and experience. As a net is made up of a series of ties, so are our thoughts, words and deeds. All life arise and fall interdependently. As life leads, so death follows...an yet, life is renewed as the seasons, the sun's warmth or moonlight's glow.

In this brevity and preciousness of human life, let us awaken to its true meaning. May we us discover its wonders and joys and repay our gratitude forward having to live here and now!

What do you see in Life's reflection? Namo Amida Butsu.

Good morning all. Welcome to our spiritual home--the Kona

Hongwanji--the temple of the Buddha's Great Compassionate Vow. I am very grateful to join you and I hope that you will share your spiritual gifts with me as you are already with those around you. This place Kona is our place of residence, in work, play and living.

Hawaii-Kona is replete with a noble and brave history of cultures and peoples of this land, indigenous, as well as those of us who settled here from their countries of origin and ancestry.

"Ji" of Hongwanji means temple, sanctuary or spiritual home, and "Hongwan" means the Buddha's Great Compassion, its source, the wisdom-compassion of all Buddhas and Bodhisattvas who praise the virtues of Amida, the oneness of all beings and immeasurable Light and Life or Namo Amida Butsu. Housed in this sanctuary is just one symbol of Great Compassion—the Buddha's wisdom-compassion—Amida Buddha. This dynamic truth and spiritual power are not sitting or lying down, but standing fully erect, moving to embrace all beings in the timeless reality of past, present and future.

This spiritual energy encompasses to transform beings tell of the meaning of Vow or spiritual Vows--forty-eight spokes of light in number distilled to the 18th Vow of Great Compassion ever one with all beings expressed the Nembutsu.

At base a dais of gold-leafed, rare sandal-wood, the lotus--a timeless symbol of renewal and awakening found not only in Buddhism and Hinduism, but, beyond 8 thousand years in Egyptian culture and myth. Out of the muck and mire of this world, blossoms the purity and rarity of the beautiful, splendid lotus--the "pundarika", a spiritual symbol of the Buddha celebrating the person of true-entrusting in Amida's great compassion.

As Buddhism travels through Asia, even Lao Tzu the great Taoist sage would proclaim:

If you look to others for true fulfillment,

you will not be fulfilled.

If your true happiness depends on money,

you will not be happy with yourself.

Being content, joyful with who you are

and what you have are things as they are.

To realize nothing is lacking, the whole world and you are one...

Is not our genuine happiness, to cherish and experience the simple joy of being alive--to love and to be loved--completely without any reservation? This is at the heart of true spirituality and the mother of all human virtues--the core awakening of Shin practice.

Gratitude renews and creates happiness as it makes us feel complete, full, realizing that as long as we have our minds about us, such joy is what is truly required to live as a human being--in the present, here and now.

In daily living, when things are going well, it was just a matter of time, when they would take a turn for the worse. However, despite life's challenges and difficulties, is it not my responsibility and choice to do the all the good I can and become the best person I can for myself and for those around me? If Shin begins and returns to the power of gratitude, let's begin with

often taking the time to thank and appreciate those around us physically and spiritually who have given us the gift of love and quidance not matter how long or short their lives have been.

In this spirit, let gather together and celebrate the 125th anniversary of our state Shin Buddhist Sangha's founding... Who is Amida Buddha? Amida Buddha are all that is life presenting itself to teach us the truth of life we could not see ourselves...They first are realized in our parentage and family...Namo Amida Butsu.

I still remember the really hot 'ocha' that Mrs. Saegusa made and the little sweets that Mrs. Nakanishi brought after the services. When I had a memorial service for my brother, it was a personal one with only my sister and myself in attendance. I find it comforting that I can remember him in such a personal way.

I spoke at length with new Honpa president Pieper Toyama at the State Lay Convention this past weekend. Sorry, most of it was not church business. He and his wife Lois had their first teaching assignments at Honokaa High and he was my first high school English teacher. We regularly invite them to our class reunions, as they were only four years older than we were, and they seemed more like our buddies than our teachers. He has quite a story, as he was brought up as a good Episcopalian by his dad, and came to Buddhism later in life.

Reverend Bruce is going to encourage everyone to come to temple. He encourages you all to give him a call anytime, so he can get to know us all. Don't be surprised if he calls YOU!!!

AFFIRMATION RITES

The meaning of the Affirmation Rites becomes clear if we look into the original name, "Kie-Shiki". <u>Kie</u> means to seek refuge, and in Buddhism, we mean to seek refuge in the Three Treasures of the Buddha, Dharma, and Sangha. The other part <u>Shiki</u> means ritual. Therefore, with these meanings in mind, the term "Affirmation Rites" was adopted.

AFFIRMATION RITES IS OFFICIATED BY THE BISHOP OF HONPA HONGWANJI MISSION OF HAWAII. IT IS A RITUAL THAT GIVES THE RECIPIENT A DEFINITE AWARENESS THAT HE/SHE IS BECOMING A FOLLOWER OF THE BUDDHA'S TEACHINGS AND A MEMBER OF THE HONGWANJI. DURING THE RITES, EACH RECIPIENT WILL RECEIVE HIS/HER OWN HOMYO (DHARMA BUDDHIST NAME) FROM THE BISHOP.
