Good morning all. Welcome to our Autumn Higan service. Spring and Autumn Higan are observed twice annually when the turning of the earth on its axis is straight up, the northern and southern hemispheres are equally distanced from the sun's rays. The days and nights are neither too hot nor too cold. For those countries below and above the equator, experiencing the seasons' distinct changes, the equinox is a welcome relief between the bitter winter cold and the sweltering summer heat.

In the Shin pathway, the emphasis on Higan (Birth to the other-shore of Amida's pure land) is characterized by the bodhisattva's practice of the six paramitas. 1) The first paramita is selfless giving. This means non-attachment to the object given, who the giver is and the subject of giving. What makes the practice of paramitas very difficult for ordinary persons such as myself to realize, it's impossible to take the giver, the object or the subject out of the human equation altogether.

The other five selfless practices are: 2) Moral discipline and applying precepts of behavior - how we conduct ourselves; 3) Patience and forbearance-not getting into arguments or confrontations with others; 4) Diligence and enthusiasm - not taking too much on; on the other hand, laziness; 5) Meditation or concentration--not falling into unwholesome patterns of thoughts, words and behavior. Living a fast-paced lifestyle, inhaling our spiritual breath is developing an inner spiritual space and pace and exhaling-self-awareness and reflection of ourselves in relation to others or the light of great compassion; 6) True Wisdom is to know and experience the maturity of our strengths, as well as limits, the depth and temperament of our fragile egos floating in a vast ocean, washed over by the waves of great compassion.

In my everyday living, <u>compassion</u> is the strength of an ego thinking I am capable of doing for others due to my ability or intelligence. <u>Great compassion</u> is to genuinely experience the limitations of said abilities and intelligence, consequently entrusting this imperfect self to a <u>Natural compassion</u>. Like the sun warmth, raindrops refreshing the parched soil, the flow of the seasons or the wind's breeze, great compassion flows naturally within...

The bodhisatta's six paramitas shadows the early theravada path of the 8-fold path categorized by thoughts, words and deeds. The significant departure of the six paramitas mirror the bodhisattva's practices completing unsurpassed spiritual vows for liberating self and others to supreme enlightenment. This mutually-inclusive, spiritual reality is the timeless activity that embraces all beings - past, present and future - man or woman, young or old, simple or wise, pure or evil. The Pure Land sacred story of Amida accomplishing seemingly impossible vows after aeons of spiritual endeavor is the perfect practice directed and suited for ordinary beings as myself. Shinran Shonin, our inspirational founder thus proclaims, "...his name is Amida-tathagata of unhindered light and life..."

Cleaning the Kona Hongwanji storehouse recently, excavated were three large scrolls, inscribed on each, the Sangha Memorial (EiTaiKyo) donors from the earliest period up to the recent. The annual donorships to this Sangha Memorial observance around November are set aside directed toward use for temple-sangha crisis. Each donor is signified by their Buddha-Dharma-name or Homyo. And while at first glance, the Homyo is personal, as a Dharma system, this reflects the dynamic working of great compassion returning to our limited world without end. The Buddha-Dharma Name or bodhisattva-ship is our shared spiritual stewardship to Dharma Sangha members and larger community. I hope we will consider exhibiting Amida Buddha's Okagesama - these three large scrolls on the walls of the inner sanctuary. This reminds us regularly of our grateful responsibility to thrive Kona Hongwanji as both a spiritual non-profit and an umbrella organizations that serves to provide for a larger community beginning with our organizational related-affiliates.

I for myself, unable to speak for others, as I am with all my foibles and deep imperfections bound by greed, anger and ignorance, I can say only the gracious Name as thanksgiving.

Let us bow our heads in shared-appreciation:

In the sacred story on the Buddha of immeasurable Life (Larger Sutra), the Great Practice of compassion proclaimed by all Buddhas and Bodhisattvas of various pure lands is to say the Name of Amida in adoration and praise. The Nembutsu of great compassion -- Namo Amida Butsu -- is without limit, filling the hearts and minds of all beings. Imperfect beings as we, saying the Name of our shared-gratitude is none other than Amida's Vow for realizing birth in the Pure Land, immediately returning to this world to liberate others. Namo Amida Butsu...

#### DHARMA EDUCATOR'S CONFERENCE

A Dharma School Teachers Conference hosted by a district comes every two years. This year the Dharma School Teachers of Oahu hosted the conference at the Ala Moana Hotel on October 11 - 12, 2014. As the planning committee gathered they wrestled with ideas for the conference - should it be filled with lesson plans, or should it have a famous speaker from the mainland, or should the sessions deal with social issues? After much discussion, the committee decided to do none of these. They decided to change the name of the conference to "Dharma Educators' " and that it would include everyone in Hawaii Kyodan because we are all educators of the Dharma. Hence, the theme "Engage! The Dharma"

From that point on, we walked on a new path but always with the intent of the engagement of the Dharma foremost in our minds. We decided to ask James Koshiba to be our keynote speaker. He is a writer, consultant, and organizer whose work focuses on building community around island values and ideals. Many of these values and ideals go hand in hand with Buddhist values. He co-founded Kanu Hawaii, a non-profit organization dedicated to building a social movement for sustainable communities, rooted in personal commitments to change. Under his leadership, Kanu attracted a membership of 20,000 individuals spread across every Hawaiian island in under 5 years.

Connected to the keynote address, participants were given the opportunity to break up into 7 small groups to discuss their thoughts on the address as well as the challenges they were experiencing personally or at their temple. The groups were ably assisted by facilitators from the Mindful Hawaii organization. They were Paula Allen, Stephen Chinen, Ernestine Enomoto, Karl Minke, Rod Moriyama, La Vonne Richardson, and James Toyama.

After a delicious lunch, the participants attended two of four workshop sessions in the afternoon.

Workshop 1: Gratitude by Pieper Toyama

Workshop 2: Buddhist Study Center Fellowship Club Panel. The panel members were Jessica Galacgac, Lacy

Tsutsuse, Emi Hashi, Dustin Iwasaki, and Bryce Ikeda.

Workshop 3: Social Media by Robin Dazzeo Workshop 4: Gatha Singing by BJ Soriano

The workshops were well-attended and enjoyed by everyone, even the morning's facilitators.

The day was not done. After a sumptuous dinner buffet, challenging work lay ahead. The participants were divided into 8 mixed temple groups and they discussed the challenges that were noted at the facilitated sessions such as temple membership, use of social media, or youth involvement. The groups worked on ideas that would assist their temples in overcoming these challenges. They would have one year to work on their projects. The projects and results would be reported to the Commissioner on Buddhist Education in their district who would then bring it to the state level so ideas would be circulated statewide.

After a restful night, the participants shared their projects the next day. It was interesting to hear out-of-the box ideas. The sharing of ideas spurred other groups to tweak their own projects. It was also encouraging to hear many temples planning to incorporate social media to reach out to the greater community.

The planning committee's goal was to infuse energies and ideas to be spread throughout the state. As we watched everyone diligently working, we feel that it will bring about next year's theme, "Embrace Change - Awareness", into fruition.

#### HIGAN: A TIME OF RENEWAL - WHY KONA HONGWANJI? Part II by Bruce Y. Nakamura

Huston Smith, author of the classic bestseller, The World's Religions, states in his book, "Why Religion Matters,":

"...Wherever people live, whenever they live, they find themselves faced with three inescapable challenges: how to win food and shelter from their environment, how to get along with one another, and how to relate themselves with the total scheme of things that include living and dying. And while many of us today think this third area is nebulous, if not questionable, we should remind ourselves that religious artifacts are the oldest forms that archeologists have discovered consistently as testament to humanity's spirituality..."

The Kona Hongwanji temple Buddhist community today faces the same challenges we have state-wide as Honpa Hongwanji. And while some may take for granted that we are a mission from abroad, the reality is we are an autonomous religious non-profit organization over a century old, that has thrived and peaked as an cultural-ethnic community within the last 30-40 years. What began as the mission's start began with the first temple built in Hookena, South Kona with the Rev. Gyoshin Sato in 1897, the mission grew to meet the needs of an expanding ethnic-cultural community that hinged primarily on an succeeding coffee industry. At the turn of the century a Buddhist women's group, the Fujinka (today Buddhist Women's Association or BWA) began, who in turn started the first Sunday School. By 1901 Kona Hongwanji purchased 3 acres of much needed land to build a new temple. By post WWII in 1949, two additional acres adjoining the cemetery were purchased.

By 1952 the 9<sup>th</sup> residing minister, the Rev. Shonen Tamekuni inaugurated the Kona Hongwnaji Gakuan, a Japanese Language School. Under the 12<sup>th</sup> minister, the Rev. Shoyei Hatta 1964-1980, a Social Hall, four classrooms, lavatories and a large kitchen were constructed. A recreation facility that included a judo hall, storage, a game room and a tennis court were completed by 1975.

The Kyodan-Sangha undertook its largest project to date with building a new temple and parsonage in 1976. The new temple was inaugurated in ceremonies celebrating the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Kona Hongwanji with a total cost of \$550,000 that included the parsonage. And while membership families peaked at 458 in 1996 under the 14<sup>th</sup> residing minister, the Rev. Hosho

Shindo, as the 16th residing minister, I join a reported statistics to the state Hongwanji -- 257 families dues-paying membership in the last quarter of 2014.

The financial challenges have not diminished for our parent organization - Kona Hongwanji. With the fast pace of modern living and the heyday of the majority of Kona Japanese families prospering with their coffee business a thing of the past, a time when all associated affiliates under the Kona Hongwanji umbrella were Kona Hongwanji member families is no longer true today.

Kona Hongwanji must continue to thrive and grow in order for affiliate-related organizations under its umbrella to prosper. A broad organizational and financial reassessment are crucial. All organizations under this umbrella can help define our shared stewardship -- taking up our fair-share of the organizational, financial and social responsibilities not only to their own organizations, but as well to our umbrella vision, Kona Hongwanji and the larger community.

In the meantime, a shared membership and temple stewardship of the three basic needs shared must be on-going. Financial, social and spiritual pathways overlap today. Effective leadership is a mutual endeavor of shared values, strategies and goals to benefit all organizations, as well as its parent association, the Kona Hongwanji temple-sangha.
