Spring Seminar 2014

The public is invited to participate in Honpa Hongwanji Hilo Betsuin's annual Spring Seminar, March 14-15, 2014. Featured speaker will be the Rev. Yoshihide Matsubayashi, former bishop of the Buddhist Churches of Canada. Events include a public lecture Friday evening from 7: 00 p.m. and a seminar on Saturday, 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

It was a pleasant surprise to hear of Rev. Matsubayashi's connections to the Big Island. He was born in Ola'a (now Kea'au) in 1935, but was raised in Japan. He joined the U.S. Army in 1956 and was honorably discharged in 1958. His wife, Kyoko, is a sister of the late Rev. Thom Nakanishi, former Rimban at Hilo Betsuin and Bishop of Hawaii Kyodan. He and his wife have three sons and six grandchildren.

Rev. Matsubayashi has had an impressive career. After graduating from Ryukoku University in 1967, he went on to earn a M.A. in Buddhist Studies from Kyoto University in 1967, and a Ph.D. Ed. in Multicultural Education from the University of San Francisco in 1984. He taught Asian Religious Literature at the Institute of Buddhist Studies at Berkeley, CA, as well as at California State University at Sacramento.

He has served in many capacities at many temples including Hawaii Betsuin, Kona Hongwanji, and Ewa Hongwanji. In 1993, he was appointed Bishop of the Buddhist Churches of Canada and served for five years. Thereafter, he served at White River Buddhist Temple in Washington, Buddhist Temple of Salinas, and the Monterey Peninsula Buddhist Temple in California. In 2006, he became Rimban of the Seattle Betsuin from which he retired and became Minister Emeritus of the Buddhist Churches of America. He came out of retirement briefly and served as Retired Kaikyoshi at the New York Buddhist Church. He finally retired and is now living in Fremont, CA.

The public lecture on Friday evening is free. For the Saturday seminar, the cost is \$8.00, to cover printing costs and lunch. Anyone wishing to attend the Saturday session must register at the temple office by March 10, 2014. Rev. Matsubayashi has recently published a book, *Light of the Dharma*, which traces the teachings, touching on modern day relevance and traditions. Information will follow regarding the availability of the book at the seminar. Everyone is welcome.

Faith or Works?

In the Western world, Shinran Shonin is often described as the Buddhist Martin Luther because, like the founder of the Protestant Reformation in the Christian world, Shinran said that what you believe is even more important than what you do in life. He believed that faith alone (Shinjin) could lead one to rebirth in the Pure Land, just as Luther believed faith alone could get one into heaven. Of course, Shinran said this 300 years before Luther, so maybe Martin Luther is the Christian Shinran Shonin.

Lately, I've been studying the world's great religions through The Great Courses CDs and have found that they have a lot in common. In fact, the history of religion since prehistoric times shows a progression from ritual to belief throughout the world with changes taking place everywhere at roughly the same times. Human beings, it turns out, are much more alike than they are different.

The first objects that archaeologists label as religious in nature, and the first prehistoric temples, show that human beings once worshipped fertility above all else. In the days when hunter/gatherer tribes were just beginning to settle down in tiny farming communities, everyone knew the survival of the tribe or village depended on the fertility of plants, animals and people. Fertility failed from time to time, so people came up with religious rituals to raise the odds in their favor. In the beginning, that's all there was to religion: sacrifice something at the right time and place while chanting the right words, and all would be right with the universe. Children would be born to keep the tribe going, and they would have enough plants and animals to eat.

Supernatural forces or gods were generally thought of as female, because in humans and animals, life sprang from them. If you think we've changed a lot during the last 11,000 years, remember we still use the phrases "Mother Nature," or "Mother Earth" today. The idea of female fertility led to a long line of goddesses throughout history. All cultures had female deities. Even in modern times many Catholics worship the Virgin Mary as "The Mother of God." In Chinese and Japanese Buddhism, the very spirit of compassion is Guanyin or Kannon, usually portrayed as female. Tibetan Buddhism has Tara. The Hindu religions have thousands of female deities, one for each male god.

As villages grew into ever larger cities, walls and armies were built up to protect people from neighboring armies who might try to take their crops and livestock. People relied on strong, well-armed men to defend their cities, or to conquer other cities and bring back the wealth. By 2,000 B.C.E., religion was refocusing on male war gods. Greece and Rome had Zeus and Jupiter, respectively. Persians had Ahura Mazda. The Aryans, ancestors of the people of both Iran and India, had Indra. Abraham, the first patriarch of both Judaism and Islam, worshipped Yahweh, a war god very similar to others around the world.

People still worshipped in the ancient style: build a temple at a sacred spot, make offerings of crops and sacrifice animals, designate priests to chant the right words and the city would be blessed with fertility and success in war. It didn't much matter what people believed. No one really questioned the existence of gods. They were just a fact of life. What mattered was pleasing them with the proper rituals. In every part of the world, what counted in religion was what people did, not what they believed. Works trumped faith every time.

Then, around 500 B.C.E., give or take a couple of hundred years, something changed, and it changed everywhere in the world at roughly the same time. Historians now call this the Axial Age, because the wheel of history seems to revolve around this point in time the way a wheel revolves around an axle. For the very first time, morality entered into religion. People began to believe they should refrain from stealing, killing, raping and such, not necessarily because they wanted to refrain from those things, but because gods, or even philosophers like Confucius, Shakyamuni Buddha, Greek philosophers and Jewish prophets told them they couldn't lead happy lives while behaving in such a fashion. This one period in human history, short compared with the thousands of years of ritual that came before it, produced the philosophers of ancient Greece, Zoroastrianism in Persia, Hinduism, Buddhism and Jainism in India, and Confucianism and Daoism in China.

Ritual was still very important in religion, but moral behavior became even more important. Good behavior was still just a way to please the gods, or at least the philosophers, but to live a moral life, people had to believe the gods or founders of their religions were right. For the first time, people had to think about what their religion was saying and choose to believe in it.

Humanity had taken a big step, together, but this was still just the beginning of faith. We were still a thousand years away from the Shinjin of Shinran and the absolute faith of Martin Luther, so let's look at that next month.
