Faith Alone

Last month, we were talking about how religion has changed during the past few thousand years from ritual (what you do) to faith (what you believe). Religion was mostly ritual in the beginning. People made sacrifices, priests chanted words, the sun came up, the crops grew and babies were born. No one really thought about it beyond that. There wasn't much of a moral element. If a priest said a god had commanded your people to destroy the neighboring town and steal its wealth, well, that's what you did. If your people were victorious, it meant your god was stronger than their god.

No one knows exactly why, but that changed between 800 and 200 B.C.E., and it changed all over the old world. Historians call this the Axial Age. This was the time of Shakyamuni Buddha, of course, who taught the nature of reality, the cause of suffering, and a way out of the whole mess. He wasn't big on rituals. He even forbade his followers from making any pictures or statues of him because he didn't want to be worshipped. He wanted people to listen to his advice and look into their own minds. He taught that how you look at things is most important. Once you saw things as they really were, he said, your behavior would change too, because you would understand you are a part of everything else, and whatever you do to anyone else you are also doing to yourself. In the same time and place, Vardhamana Mahavira founded Jainism and set moral standards so strict that even today some of his followers wear gauze masks so they can't accidentally harm insects by inhaling them. These extraordinary men changed the belief systems of the Indian subcontinent, so the various religions we call Hinduism also took on a more moral tone. In China, a belief system called Daoism developed that is so similar to Buddhism that today Zen owes as much to one as it does to the other. Even more important in China were the moral and behavioral standards set by Confucius. Those standards were part of the Chinese civil service examinations until 1910.

The Persians had the same ancestors as the people of India, and once performed rituals to the same gods. Their version of the Buddha was the prophet Zoroaster, who taught that the universe was engulfed in a titanic struggle between good and evil, equally powerful. He said people would have to look into their hearts and choose between the two. The Jews, whose kingdom had been destroyed by the Babylonians, were freed by the Persians. Jewish prophets began to sound like Zoroaster and Judaism became a moral system, not just a ritual one. Jews continued to make sacrifices at their temple in Jerusalem, but they now believed that God knew what was in their hearts and would hold them accountable for their behavior. These ideas were passed directly down to Christianity and Islam. The Greeks continued to make sacrifices to the old gods, but new philosophers like Socrates stressed moral behavior. All across Asia and Europe, beliefs came to be just as important as rituals, but the transition was not yet complete.

Today, we divide the way we look at history into two categories: before or after Christ, B.C. or A.D. It's more politically correct today to use B.C.E. which means "before the common era," but the time of Christ was the dividing line of European history. As in the Axial Age, however, the first century of what we call the Common Era was important all across Europe and Asia in many religions. This era saw the birth of Mahayana Buddhism, and the first mentions of Amida Buddha. This new type of Buddhism stressed the Bodhisattva ideal. It was no longer enough to gain enlightenment for yourself. Now you would also help everyone else do the same. Within a couple of centuries, Buddhists began talking about the Pure Land as a place you could go after death to achieve enlightenment. In the West, in the Roman province of Judea, a Jew named Jesus taught a whole new kind of relationship with God, who he called Abba (papa in modern English). He said God was not distant from humans, but very close and personal, and that the Kingdom of God was to be found inside the human heart. How you treated others was far more important than old Jewish temple law. Judaism also changed drastically around this time after the Romans destroyed the great temple in Jerusalem and scattered the Jews across the empire. Most Jews rejected the idea that Jesus was their long-awaited Messiah, but Judaism itself became much like early Christianity, which was not so different from Mahayana Buddhism. The emphasis was no longer on priestly rituals, but on a personal relationship with religion, and that required faith.

By the 1100s and 1200s, the center of Buddhism had moved from China to Japan. A new generation of thinkers further developed Chinese ideas to bring enlightenment closer to the common people. In Zen, Eisai brought koans to shake people out of their logical patterns of thought that were standing between

them and enlightenment. Dogen introduced Zazen meditation. Nichiren taught that the Lotus Sutra was so powerful one could gain enlightenment merely by chanting its name. Likewise, Honen and Shinran taught that chanting the name of Amida Buddha would ensure rebirth in the Pure Land and enlightenment. All of these Japanese monks came up with short cuts around all the scholarly study and priestly rituals that had previously been the hallmark of Japanese Buddhism. Samurai and royalty took to Zen, while even peasants had time for the simple chants required by the Nichiren and Pure Land schools. The only catch was that in order for the new methods to work, people had to believe that they would work. These traditions have plenty of rituals today, as we saw during the visit of the Monshu to Hilo a few years ago, but at heart, only faith is required to gain enlightenment. Within two or three centuries, Martin Luther and John Calvin brought the idea of pure faith to the Christian world, and Jewish and Islamic thinkers kept pace. Today, when people discuss religion, they talk about what they believe a lot more than they talk about what rituals they perform. The rituals we still have are more shorthand expressions of faith than they are ways to please gods. That this change from ritual to faith is almost universal around the world shows that people of all cultures think quite a bit alike. Shakyamuni Buddha taught us that we are all one, and the founders of most religions have been agreeing with him ever since. You can have faith in that.
