Shinran Shonin was born on May 21, 1173 in Hino, an area southeast of Kyoto. His given name was Matsuwakamaru. His loss of both parents at an early age moved him to enter the Buddhist priesthood at age 9. He studied for 20 years at Mt. Hiei home of 3,000 monasteries, enduring the most difficult of meditations and practices. At age 29 he abandoned the method of finding enlightenment by self-power (jiriki) and placed his faith in Amida's power (tariki) to realize Buddhahood. Shinran coined the term "Jodo Shinshu" meaning "True Teachings of the Pure Land".

THE LIFE OF SIDDHARTHA GOTAMA SAKYAMUNI-BUDDHA (part 2 of 4)

THE PRINCE LEAVES HOME

One day the prince noticed a bird pull a worm out of the ground during a dedication ceremony of the Harvest. Immediately the bird was plucked from the sky and killed by a hawk, only to be shot down by a hunter. Seeing this merciless cycle of birth-and-death signaled Siddhartha a call to seek spiritual liberation from this merciless cycle.

On yet another occasion, Siddhartha went walking in the countryside with his cousin, Devadatta. Having brought his bow and arrow, Devadatta sighted a flock of swans over-head and brought one down with his arrow. Both boys ran to the wounded swan, but Siddhartha reached the swan first. He soothed the wound with cool leaves. Devadatta demanded the swan was rightfully his because he had shot it with his arrow.

The prince, however, proposed that the kingdom's council deliver the final judgment on this matter of life-and-death. A wise elder rose from his seat, saying, "A life must belong to him who seeks to save life; that life does not belong to one who seeks to destroy it. This creature belongs to him who seeks to save its life. Let the prince have the swan."

The king, painfully aware of his son's future destiny tried to divert his course. The king built a palace for every season. As soon as the prince was of age, he was wed to the beautiful Princess Yasodhara. And though as newly-weds, their marital life even more exciting, beneath its surface, Prince Siddhartha's introspection seemed to grow more intense, keenly aware of the universal suffering, uncertainty and change that underlie all existence.

One day having discreetly exiting the eastern gate, Siddhartha came upon an emaciated old man. He knew instinctively, that someday, he too would have to become very old. On another occasion existing the southern gate, he saw a man wasting away from disease, and yet, out of the western gate, he saw a funeral procession. Finally leaving the northern ate, Siddhartha saw a monk, an ascetic who had abandoned the way of the world. The prince was struck by his peaceful demeanor. Spiritually traumatized by the world at hand, Siddhartha knew he could no longer ignore them. These visions so sharpened the prince's determination to seek Life's Truth and its Liberation outside the gates of the castle.

Thus at the age of twenty-nine, Siddhartha was determined to abandon his princely life. Though the princess had given birth to their beautiful son for all to rejoice, Siddhartha knew his beloved son, Rahula (Obstacle) would be-labor his spiritual quest. No longer able to deny its course, he slipped out quietly into the night. His quest sought out those who call themselves the "forest-dwellers". Fortunately his extended family cared for his wife and son--a common practice among the various classes of India that yielded a great number of spiritual renuncients of the day.

THE QUEST FOR ENLIGHTENMENT

Suddhartha traveled south to a forest next to the capital city of Rajagrha in the country of Magadha. The greatest thinkers of his day were drawn to this place of great learning and spiritual exchange. Siddhartha went about inquiring with many renown teachers in an attempt to quench his spiritual thirst. The former prince was determined to seek and experience the truth directly for himself. He joined a group of five ascetics whose dwelling was in a forest next to Uruvilva village. Siddhartha become so strict in his practices, he limited his daily intake to a mere grain of rice. At times he consumed nothing. He would reach into the emaciated cavity of his stomach taking hold of his spine. He pursued the ascetic path to such an extreme, he often lost consciousness and collapsed. It was even reported to his father, the king, that the former prince had died.

Six arduous years of severe asceticism followed. Siddartha's mind and body so weakened that he was approaching death and self-annihilation. Refusing to die he was drawn back to the world of the living -- determined that he had not yet experienced a true spiritual freedom between the extremes of princely life and the life of severe asceticism.
