During the week long observances, emphasis is placed on observance of the Six Paramitas (percepts) which lead to “the other shore”. Paramita is the Sanskrit for “gone to the other shore”.

## **MUSIC UPLIFTS OUR SPIRITS**

Have you ever noticed the doll displays at the back of the temple just adjacent to the late Colonel Ellison Onizuka's picture and mementos honoring his illustrious career and life contributions?

At the top shelves are two traditional Japanese displays encased in glass. To the right is a maiko, a beautiful young girl in gorgeous kimono training to be a geisha. The doll to the left is a clay version of Kuroda, Yoshitaka, also known as Kuroda, Kanbei. Perhaps you've seen its popular version from the Taiga Series on Kiku Television? Kuroda, Kanbei (Yoshitaka) is poised, holding a sword-spear in one hand and a large shallow bowl (empty of sake) in the other. He is performing in dance pose, one of many popular versions that have survived today.\

Historically, Kuroda, Yoshitaka was a high-ranking general and famous strategist who served three warlords, Oda, Nobunaga, Toyotomi, Hideyoshi and Tokugawa, Ieyasu. He was held captive in prison after failed peace negotiations with one of Nobunaga's foes, crippled in one leg and was no longer able to rejoin the battlefield. Kuroda, Kanbei was the only general who could possibly rival said three prominent leaders, but he was bound by his military code to loyally serve. His dream was that, someday, Japan would be unified in peace under one governance. Kuroda, Kanbei was known for his chivalry and magnanimous spirit and celebrated today in both, folk music and popular culture.

Kuroda, Yoshitaka was known to wield his famous sword-spear (nagamasa) on the battlefield as well as ritual dance. This actual sword-spear remains today as a national treasure, what is less known are the legends around popular songs from which the Hongwanji traditions derived and adapted a musical piece known today in the Buddhist hymn-gatha "Dedication" or "Ondokusan".

In its earlier version, Shinran Shonin traces his inspiration words of our 5th Pure Land Teacher, Shan-ao or Zendo-Daishi (Jpnse.) in his "Hymns of the Dharma-Ages":

**Such is the benevolence of Amida's great compassion,  
That we must strive to return it, even to the breaking of our bodies;  
Such is the benevolence of the masters and the true teachers,  
That we must endeavor to repay it, even to our bones' becoming dust.**

#### **DEDICATION**

**For the blessings of Amida's boundless compassion,  
We must dedicate ourselves, though our bodies be broken:  
For the guidance we owe our spiritual teachers,  
We must devote ourselves, though our bones be crushed. Ibid.; p.32**

In the "Tract That Laments the Differences" (Tannisho), Yui-n-bo recalls the words of Shinran Shonin:

**"...The attainment of Enlightenment in the next life is the main purport of the Other-Power teaching of the Pure Land School, for it is attained by the path of firmly established Faith. Again, it is the Easy Practice to be performed by the lowly gifted, and it is the teaching which does not choose between good and evil.**

**After all, since it is extremely difficult to sever all passions and evil hindrances in this life, even the pure monks who practice the Shingon and Hokke teachings pray for Enlightenment in the next life. How much more so with us! Though we lack both disciplinary practices and wisdom-knowledge, we can cross over the painful sea of Birth-and-Death by boarding the ship of Amida's Vow. Upon our reaching the shore of the Recompensed Land the dark clouds of evil passions will be instantly cleared away and the enlightened moon of Dharma-nature will quickly appear. Then we shall be one with the Light unhindered in the ten quarters and shall benefit all sentient beings. Then and only then, can we say that we are enlightened..."**

Shinran stops short of regarding the foolish being who attains shinjin and joy (Faith) who reaching the land of peace becomes, none other than Amida Buddha. He writes in his "Hymns of the Pure Land":

Tathagata is none other than nirvana;  
Nirvana is called Buddha-nature.  
We cannot attain it in the state of foolish beings;  
We will realize it on reaching the land of peace.  
The person who attains shinjin and joy is taught to be equal to the Tathagatas.  
Great shinjin is itself Buddha-nature;  
Buddha-nature is none other than Tathagata.

(93-94) Hymns on Amida Buddha on Various Sutras; p. 77.

### Closing Meditation & Appreciation

If you are touched by kindness, share it with others. If you think you are fortunate, spread its blessings to others. If you encounter suffering, patiently endure and go forward. If you are lonely, open your hearts and let others in. If you seek change, let your old self die to new opportunities. Value these rare encounters and become a dharma friend and true human being. Like flowers connecting another in Aloha with no end, we are one in the great compassion of life to become Amida Buddha.

### **THE LIFE OF SIDDHARTHA GOTAMA SAKYAMUNI--BUDDHA (part 4 of 4)**

Notably like no other teacher before him, Sakyamuni Buddha set aside a deeply entrenched caste system based upon thousands of years of Aryan, Vedic and Upanishadic tradition and practice. He offered a democratic model, made available to all who aspired to explore the Dharma directly by self-awareness, reflection, meditation and experience. For 45 years, he taught the rich and the poor, the powerful and the lowly, from beggars to sage with deep and abiding compassion for all.

## SAKYAMUNI'S FINAL JOURNEY

Today we know of at least six historical sites attributed to the life and teachings of Sakyamuni Buddha. Lumbini Garden is known as his birth-place. Buddha-Gaya is known as the site where Siddhartha experienced his spiritual awakening under the Boh Tree. Vulture Peak at Sarnath is the site of his first Dharma sermon to the five ascetics known as "The Turning of the Dharma Wheel". Rajgriha is known as his residence.

The Bamboo Grove Monastery was his residence during the monsoon season. And Kushinagara is the site where Sakyamuni Buddha passed from human life into Pari-Nirvana or supreme enlightenment. These sites are found largely in India's northern states of Uttar Pradesh and Bihar.

Even at the advanced age of eighty Sakyamuni tirelessly continued to spread the Dharma. His final journey took him from Rajagriha to Sravasti. The World-Honored One was coming to the end of his human journey. He was deathly ill, having eaten either toxic mushrooms or improperly cooked pig-flesh according to varied accounts. Lying beneath the twin Sala trees, according to the sacred account, the Buddha revealed his final teaching:

**"My disciples my last moment has come, but do not forget that death is only the end of the physical body. The body was born from parents and nourished by food; just as inevitable are sickness and death..."**

**But the true Buddha is not a human body; it is enlightenment. A human body dies, but the wisdom of enlightenment spreads with no end in the truth and the practice of the Dharma. He who sees merely my body does not truly see me. Only he who accepts my teaching truly sees me...After my death, the Dharma shall be your teacher. Follow the Dharma faithfully and you will be true to me...**

**During the last 45 years of my life, I have withheld nothing from my teachings. There is no secret teaching, no hidden message; everything has been taught openly and clearly. My dear disciples this is the end. In a moment I shall pass into Nirvana. This is my final instruction..."**
