BISHOP MATSUMOTO'S MESSAGE FOR 2016 GANDHI DAY IN HAWAII

Reflecting on the affairs of our world, there is an escalation in the number of violent acts both at home and around the globe which has resulted in so many deaths and the suffering continues for family and communities of those that were killed and at the same time the anger and suffering of those who commit violent acts, in many cases too, still remain unabated. More than ever what our world needs is love or compassion, but a love and compassion guided by Wisdom.

This year, on the occasion of this 11th Annual Celebration of the International Day of Non-violence, I am encouraged by Mahatma Gandhi's words "Love is the strongest force the world possess, yet it is the most humblest imaginable" and "Whenever you are confronted with an opponent, conquer him with love." Gandhi is speaking about a love and compassion, higher than the highest mountain and deeper than the deepest ocean, which does not divide people but instead brings people together.

In the Buddhist Tradition, besides the famous saying repeated by Sakyamuni Buddha that "Hatred is not overcome by hatred; hatred is overcome by love. This is an ancient law," another wise and insightful saying shares

Victory creates hatred. Defeat creates suffering. The wise ones desire neither victory nor defeat... Anger creates anger... He who kills will be killed. He who wins will be defeated...Revenge can only be overcome by abandoning revenge... The wise seek neither victory nor defeat.

It is so easy to become entangled with thoughts like "I must win" or arrogantly think "I alone am right." When such thoughts arise in me, I am reminded of the wise words of Prince Shotoku who emphasized harmony and said, "Let us cease from wrath and refrain from angry looks. Nor let us be resentful when others differ from us. For all people have hearts and each heart has its own leanings. Their right is our wrong, and our right is their wrong. We are not unquestionably sages, nor are they unquestionably fools."

On this Mahatma Gandhi Day in Hawaii, let us, guided by Wisdom, reflect including self-reflect on finding the deeper causes and conditions which are resulting in the harm and suffering plaguing our world and the importance of non-violence as an expression of Compassion. May we be guided by All-Inclusive Wisdom and inspired by All-Embracing Compassion (Amida Buddha) reaching out to illumine our hearts and minds so we may realize that though we may have differences, there is also the paramount truth of the preciousness and oneness of all life.

Namo Amida Butsu and thank you!

PAST-PRESENT-FUTURE ARE ONE

In the summer of 1861 in the Hawaiian Kingdom, Hawaii's young King Alexander 'lolani Liholiho or Kamehameha IV resided at Hulihe'e Palace in Kailua Kona. The New England-style palace structure was a favorite retreat for his wife - Queen Emman and their young son. The king was there however, not to relax. The civil war had just broken out on the U.S. continent and the Confederacy had seceded - the Kingdom needed to respond in a timely manner.

There were three options on the table: support the Union, support the Confederacy or remain neutral. South Carolina had seceded at the end of 1886 and the Union surrendered Fort Sumter. Furthermore, there was the Union's shocking defeat at the First Battle of Bull Run on July 21, 1861 - news of which seems to confirm that Confederate victory was inevitable.

Alexander Liholiho is hesitant. Supporting the Confederacy would offend the United States - the kingdom's most valuable trading partner. Supporting the Union could spell trouble for Hawai'i which in 1861 maintained only a small military garrison. If Hawaii was to declare its support for the Union, the Confederacy would certainly send warships. The Union would unlikely help to defend the islands if the kingdom came under attack.

Neutrality appealed to the king. His grandfather, Kamehameha I had neither sided with Great Britain nor the United States during the War of 1812. Ships on both sides anchored frequently and the King maintained his position of neutrality facing no threats from either side. Upon receiving word that Great Britain and France have declared neutrality.

On August 26, 1861 the Hawaiian Kingdom officially declares neutrality in America's civil war.

Despite the kingdom's policy, the Islands would become embroiled in the civil war, with its citizens joining both sides of the conflict. The civil war between the north and the south, while occurring thousands of miles away would profoundly alter the course of Hawai'i's history.

According to historian Justin Vance co-author or *Asians & Pacific Islanders and the Civil War*, it's not surprising that most citizens of the Hawaiian Kingdom volunteered for the Union. "A lot of these Hawaiian-born volunteers are from New England families with abolitionist ties. They grew up opposed to slavery. Some even maintained ideas about equality,"

Hawai'i had another prominent tie and that was with whaling with New England. Since the first whalers entered the Island waters in 1819, native Hawaiians were eager to sign on as crew. Island citizens maintained close ties with American sailors so when the civil war broke out, many native Hawaiians enlisted alongside New England sailors in the Union Navy.

The Hawaiian Kingdom, too, shared moral empathy with the Union's cause; The Kingdom's Constitution was written primarily by American William Little Lee, first justice to the Hawaiian Kingdom Supreme Court. The document guarantees universal manhood suffrage - that all men could vote regardless of race. Slavery was specifically banned and any slave arriving in the kingdom must be immediately freed from bondage.

Most native Hawaiians who joined the Union army were assigned to the US Colored Troops, though some served in the regular army. Hilo-born Timothy Henry H'olulu Pitman was the son of Kino'oleoliliha, a Hilo high-chiefess.

Today, it is impossible to determine the exact number of enlisted Hawaiian Kingdom volunteers - more than 150 years after the civil war. About 130 are known to date, but it's likely that the numbers were larger. Many names used in the military records were re-invented or simplified such as 'Joe Maui,' 'John Boy,' or 'Joseph Kanaka.' Vance estimates that as many as 200 Hawaiian Kingdom citizens fought in the war.

The war would have a lasting economic and social impact on the Hawaiian Kingdom. It marked the death of whaling, as the Union purchased most of the New England whale fleet's aging ships and sunk them as part of the naval blockade of the Southern states.

The war also sparked a sugar boom in the Hawai'i cane industry as the Union sought an alternative to Southern-grown sugar. The shift from whaling to sugar fundamentally altered both the Island landscape and its culture, from which an entire influx of immigrant contract laborers came from China, Japan, Korea, Portugal and the Philippines to work on the growing sugar plantations. Sugar supplied a profitable commodity that kept Hawai'i's involvement in transpacific trade - which eventually led to the overthrow of the monarchy in 1893 - partly from an organized part of a group of sugar magnates.

The past, present and future - dynamically and inextricably bound together in the profound present - part pre-existence conditions, part personal and collective choices - part a shared and inevitable destiny bound together in our grateful present. Namo Amida Butsu.
