Hanamatsuri or "Flower Festival", is held to commemorate the birth of Siddhartha Gautama in Lumbini Garden. He was the manifestation of Amida, the Buddha of Infinite Higher Wisdom and Compassion. During the service, a flower shrine known as hanamido, is set up in front of the main altar as a symbol of Lumbini Garden. In the shrine is placed a statuette of the infant Buddha, pointing his right hand toward the heavens and his left hand toward the earth. The sangha offers flowers and pour sweet tea over the image. Kambutsu is the rite of "bathing the body of; the Buddha." This simplified reenactment of the Buddha's birth signifies the glory and joy that filled the world of this event.

"AUWE, NO CAN HELP..."

Do you date, possibly looking for a stable, long-term relationship to later settle down? If so, have you consciously or subconsciously, factored in their racial, ethnic or cultural background in the larger picture? What are the first things you look for in a relationship? How does that figure into personal character, like-minded values, education, temperament and humor? For many of us married after-the-fact, do you really know why you married this person?

Kona Hongwanji - The Temple of the Buddha's Great Compassion traces its historical and cultural heritage around the turn of the century to Asian ancestors who came mostly from Japan. Settling on the western slopes of the Big Island, they began to build families, mostly around cultivating their later famous "Kona Coffee". In the early period, the Buddhist ways provided a gathering place to offer a calm amidst the storm in a foreign land of foreign ways, dominated by foreigners.

Today, as part of the American mainstream - Hawaii's offspring are more often, *chop-suey* or *hapa*, due to being products of intermarrying among various races, cultures and ethnic mixes. Most offspring today are beyond the 3rd or 4th generation removed from ancestral country of origin. Today young ones don't even ask their parents if it's alright to date "so-and-so". "What kind of person should I be looking for in a stable relationship and even marriage?". Our ancestors from the old country's typical response range from "most desired to least" going somewhat like this: 1) with your own kind; 2) With a related-culture; 3) Auwe, no Can Help; 4) aah, disown already. From my own grandparents' views (my mother's side) *mo betta* be Okinawan background with a good job. From my father's mother, she showed her greatest disapproval when her daughter married a "*Pilipin*" island man.

I've listened to many grandmothers throughout the years (2nd generation especially) who've said to me how adoring their grandchildren are: "I have three grandchildren, <u>but</u> you know what, my haole son-in-law is really nice. He treat me real good". In other words, grandmas often apologize indirectly for having "hakujin" son-in-laws, but qualify his status in the family by insisting how nice he is to his whole family- especially his mother-in-law.

Today our Hongwanji Buddhist sanghas are more open and welcoming to non-Japanese visitors and new faces at temple services. This was not true 20 years ago or so. Back then, regular congregants would stare and "give da stink eye" making the stranger feel unwelcome: "what are your doing in our church - you don't belong here!" Of course he'd not ever "darken" these doors again!

It's this bigotry by the like-minded - even racism by the majority of those sitting in the pews that today in a new American century, would be so disturbing, so unlike what it means to be a truly open and accepting as human beings, let alone, as actual practicing Buddhists. Genuine spirituality, Buddhist or otherwise, should not demonize other races, cultures or even religious faiths. As American citizens, our republic gave birth to the American Constitution and Bill of Rights. As such we cherish freedoms to speak in the public square, even at the risk of sounding and acting like fools. We cherish the right to assemble freely without being ejected from a political assembly, just because we disagree with the speaker and the views of the majority of those present. We cherish the right to privacy - to be left alone in our homes without "big brother" dictating our personal views, association with others. We cherish racial and sexual equality, despite some of our personal or moral misgivings of same gender sexual practices. And we must welcome immigrants as did our forbears welcomed them, turning away none, who desired freedom in America. Yet,... this is not what this article is about. And while human beings in this modern period should know better because of the development of our thinking, our principles, our laws, our experiences and their applications, this compel us to make better choices, not only for the common good, but, as well as for the unspoken rights of the fewer everywhere.

Despite all the good we must do for others, we too often deceive ourselves, as we appear wise to others with our virtuous pretenses, yet, guising outcomes in ways that might best benefit our own personal or collective interests. Shinran Shonin refers to this in his "Gutoku's Hymns of Lament and Reflection(Hymns On the Dharma Age, Tranlations, C.1993, pp 68-71 [1-6]"):

Each of us, in outward bearing,
Makes a show of being wise, good and dedicated;
But so great are our greed, perversity and deceit;
That we are filled with all forms of malice and cunning 1
Extremely difficult it to put an end to our evil nature;
The mind is like a venomous snake or scorpion.
Our performance of good acts is also poisoned;
Hence it is called false and empty practice. 2

On an inter-personal level, just in terms of simple, yet ongoing human relationships, take simple conversations: Relating to our spouse, children or family members, even with friends we're close to or with "friends" we keep at a safe distance, there is an initial hope to be genuine, yet at a deeper subconscious or unconscious level, there stirs a natural impulse, an unspoken drive to re-negotiate as to benefit oneself over the other party. This impulse, arising now dominates is divisive and calculating so that it will benefit one-self or situation. Thus, Shinran laments deeply upon his own spiritual plight, despite being immersed in the Buddha's wondrous compassion (vow):

It is hard to have a true and sincere mind.

This self is false and insincere; I completely lack a pure mind.3

Although I am without shame and self-reproach And lack a mind of truth and sincerity, Because the Name is directed by Amida, Its virtues fill the ten quarters.4

With minds full of malice and cunning, like snakes or scorpions, We cannot accomplish good acts through self-power; Although I take refuge in the true Pure Land way, And unless we entrust ourselves to Amida's directing of virtue, We will end without knowing shame and self-reproach. 5 Lacking even small love and compassion, I cannot hope to benefit sentient beings. Were it not for the ship of Amida's Vow, How could I cross the ocean of painful existence?6

How amazing, laid spiritually bare and naked in the light of Shinran's laments and reflections. They are profoundly appropriate even for our modern times. To glance over our social issues and challenges faced as community and nation merely skim the surface of deeper latent psyche and character. A deeper, awakening lays bare our deepest human impulses to dehumanize, ill-treat and isolate "us from them" because we are fearful of the worst in all of us, that can be done, not just onto others, but most of all, to ourselves.

Let us acknowledge and embrace our common-humanity, aspiring mutual- respect and universal dignity But we do this by also, affirming self-centered, arrogance, and propensity for hate and bigotry, often guised as virtue. That virtue can be mere show - selfishly gathering up greater virtue, deceptive at every turn. Thus, spiritual rebirth in this life, is rude awakening to the light of great compassion and deep imperfections altogether. How grateful, so joyous, this foolish self, together with all beings in the ten quarters attaining spiritual birth in the light of great compassion.

"I live in great compassion; I awaken to great compassion; I entrust in great compassion, How grateful for great compassion; I share great compassion. Thus, this offering of Joy shared with all beings - Namo Amida Butsu, NaManDaBu, NaManDaBu," Auwe, no can help, NaManDaBu...

HEADQUARTER'S UPDATE

Message

On June 6, 2014, I came to inherit the legacy of the Jodo Shinshu tradition through receiving the transmission from the Monshu Emeritus Ohtani Koshin, succeeding to the posts of the resident priest of Hongwanji and the Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha Monshu. Today, I would like to announce that the Commemoration on the Accession of the Jodo Shinshu Tradition (*Dento Hokoku Hoyo*) shall be scheduled for the years 2016 and 2017. My succession of the Jodo Shinshu tradition will be officially proclaimed to the Buddha and Masters, and through its observance, it is anticipated that the teaching of Amida Buddha's Primal Vow shall gain prosperity and Hongwanji in its entirety shall achieve further growth.

Amida Buddha's Primal Vow is directed without discrimination to every life and saves them just as they are. Despite our being filled with delusions and suffering, we are enabled to entrust ourselves wholeheartedly to Amida Tathagata's great compassion and be born in the Pure Land, the manifestation of the Buddha's true enlightenment. Although everything in this world, including ourselves, is unreliable, which Shinran Shonin expressed as "empty and false," we are always able to realize the assuredness in the working of the Primal Vow.

Modern scientific and technological sophistication urges us to pursue convenient and luxurious lifestyles, thereby making our desires swell boundlessly. However, I feel that people have begun to realize the futility of these efforts. In addition, such factors as the nuclear family unit and demographic shift from rural to urban areas have forced the conventional social structure to change greatly. As a result, the bonds between people have become weak, causing new anxieties and feelings of uneasiness to arise. On the global scale as well, we can see that there are a number of issues that threaten humanity's existence, such as armed conflict, economic imbalance, climate change, and the proliferation of nuclear materials, and it is anticipated that the situation will likely intensify.

Therefore, I believe it is important for us to listen to the Dharma. Listening to the Dharma clarifies for us the compassionate working of Amida Tathagata that always embraces us as just as we are and never abandons us. Hence, we should share our appreciation and gratitude for it with as many people as possible. As Nembutsu followers who are guided by the Buddha's wisdom, it is important for us to take the initiative and actively carry out programs to cope with the numerous problems and issues in contemporary society. I feel that such efforts will contribute to the actualization of a society in which everyone is able to live a life of spiritual fulfillment.

It is my hope that this upcoming Commemoration of Accession shall become a significant event as the first major step of our organization. May this occasion serve as the impetus for the Hongwanji to effectively cope with the changing times while upholding the traditional religious values based on Amida Tathagata's unconditional compassion. The Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha administration is currently formulating new long-term plans in anticipation of the 850th Anniversary of Shinran Shonin's Birth and the 800th Anniversary of the Establishment of the Jodo Shinshu Teaching.
