Shinran Shonin was born on May 21, 1173 in Hino, an area southeast of Kyoto. His given name was Matsuwakamaru. His loss of both parents at an early age moved him to enter the Buddhist priesthood at age 9. He studied for 20 years at Mt. Hiei, home of 3,000 monasteries enduring the most difficult of meditations and practices. At age 29 he abandoned the method of finding enlightenment by self-power (jiriki) and placed his faith in Amida Buddha (tariki) to realize Buddhahood. Shinran coined the term "jodo Shinshu" meaning "True Teachings of the Pure Land".

Timeless Source of Gratitude

It's easy to forget our connections with our parents, of where and how family, and our connections to various community and cultures have contributed to the joy of living today. When an elder tells stories of the difficulties growing up, they often fall on deaf ears. If we ourselves are given the opportunity to live through the life stages of parenting, grand-parenting, etc., we would also repeat things over and over to those around us.

The next month of May holds many important events to be honored and celebrated. The first Sunday will celebrate Children's Day with the Judo Club hosting the 9am service in the temple with speaker Tracy Brennen, a paramedic for the Waimea Fire-station and a Mochi-Pounding community event to follow. The third Sunday (5/15) is the Baccalaureate Service celebrating our graduates. While there is no regular service on 5/22nd, the last Sunday of May 29 will invite the Rev. Shinji Kawagoe of the Papaikou, Honohina, Honomu and Papaaloa Hongwanjis as guest speaker for our Gotan-E, Shinran's Shonin's Birthday Services (English 9:00am Jpnse.10:45am).

April's BWA Manju-Preparation & Sale brought many volunteers to make this fund-raising event a joyous occasion. The BWA Hanamatsuri-Buddha Day celebration was also joined by a KHBT BWA Rummage sale on April 10th from 7am-1pm. Our sincerest appreciation to all our membership and donor-friends who made this sale so enjoyable - a time of fellowship and renewing friendships in the community. To

our affiliates members and our temple volunteers who made the extra effort to extend themselves beyond the manju fund-raising project for a successful rummage sale - THANK YOU FROM THE HEART FOR YOUR KOKUA!.

A recent conversation recalled by an elder nissei reminded us of the mundane hardships our parents and their parents went through growing up. No one had a car and it was common to walk everywhere they went. This example alone, from this elder reminds us that given the difficulties of situations of such times, there was nothing that <u>couldn't be done</u> to subsist and even thrive in a rural, country community. She often reminds her own children and grand-children -- "...don't say - 'cannot do'..." This is a timeless narrative of what seemed nearly impossible to do, yet showing us even today, things are possible if we apply ourselves. Such are not simply the repeated ramblings of "old age".

As we grow, develop and experience the unique challenges of modern life, let us ask ourselves if we repeat habits of fears and anxieties that return us to the same point in our life—Is this not a Buddhist expression of samsara— the cycle of birth-and-death bound-up by fear, ignorance and self-delusion? Let's not pass by opportunities to enlarge our worlds and deepen our appreciation to the wonders that make everyday human life joyful and amazingly unrepeatable.

I once had a very good friend whom I loved dearly like a brother. He recently passed away in his early forty's due to a congenital heart defect. He didn't know that he had a bad heart condition until it was too late. One day while jogging near his home, he simply collapsed and died.

While we worked together in the restaurant industry, he shared with me an account of his father, one of two twin brothers. Living on Oahu their mother had lost her husband and was left to care for the children.

Apparently however, she died in a drowning incident. Her children were deeply shaken by their mother's death so soon after their father's passing. They suspected that she indeed, took her own life, thinking to spare them a life of hardship and misery by her life insurance. While understanding their mother's "best of intentions", "mom' suicide" prevented the insurance benefit going to the survivors.

Parentless, the children were forced to live with relatives. As a result, from a younger age, they had to make their way in the world. Aware of the forces surrounding their mother's death, they worked even harder to make a better life for themselves and the rest of their family. There wasn't a day when the children didn't remind themselves to learn from this tragic life – lesson. This bitter-sad memory always defining a mother's tragic memory amazingly translated into this young man's life to one of loving-kindness.

Real life indeed, is stranger than fiction. The lives surrounding his own became a timeless source of gratitude. They grounded him, inspiring courage and joy in his professional, social and personal life. A beloved "friend and brother's young life" ended in his early forty's. And though he did not outwardly identify with Buddhism or the Nembutsu teaching, that most cherished life was firmly rooted in the joy of great compassion.

We can approach, understand and appreciate the various meanings behind myth and even real-life stories. When we open up to a larger picture to life's narrative with a "bird's-eye view to the many faces of the human story, we build upon the strength and confidence of self awareness as a foundation - a basis for critical thinking, curiosity, education, reflection and gratitude - in other words, education of the "ego".

We must live in a world that braves our unique, yet, diverse human stories. That awareness of diversity also opens up ways that makes us genuinely human and more sensitive to others' unique stories, and gifts. Our conversation has no conclusion. We stand together, not separately each on our pathways—bound as one to a timeless source of gratitude in an unfolding narrative of great compassion.

For me personally, the spiritual calendar is not limited to Hoonko -- Shinran Shonin's Memorial, but in all the annual Shin Buddhist calendar, Shinran Shonin's Birthday or Gotan-E Celebration (1173-1262) is my favorite. As our Shin pathway's inspiration and founder of the Essential Pure Land Teaching (Jodo Shinshu), Shinran rejoices as the primary recipient of Amida Buddha's great compassion. Out of this deep joy Shinran transmits what he received to all who came after him.

Shinran's remarkable, even radical approach completely redefined the meaning of "universal religion". Like Sakyamuni Buddha, Shinran's vantage points bring spirituality to its most basic form of self-awareness.

Genuine religious practice can neither be self-deceptive nor cultivated for the sake of self desire. For Shinran, in Christian parley, "we are all saved or none of us are saved at all". This is Shinran's remarkable understanding of the Nembutsu - "Buddha and I are One".

We become genuinely, grateful, human beings through the selfless gift of great compassion shown to us by countless seen and unseen forces throughout our lives. Such forces continue to impact us even upon death. They do not tell us to simply do good, but to realize the limits of the good we do(as too, the profound working of our ego viz. the three poisons of greed, anger and ignorance). To awaken to the

dynamic power of compassion is also realizing the depths of our ego working; they become neither tools to strengthen our own agenda nor used to exploit others.

Subsequently Shinran says, "...we should reject this world of evil by doing good..."Wherein the larger vehicle of Mahayana Teachings emphasized 84,000 pathways to the mountain-top or supreme enlightenment, Shinran departs onto a revolutionary pathway of human self-awareness,, reflection and gratitude in the light of great compassion. I live - experience great compassion. I entrust in-and am grateful to great compassion. I share great compassion with others. Great Compassion and I are one. Namo Amida Butsu...



Yosemori served Paia/Makawao Hongwanji Mission (10/1964-8/1981) and Jikoen Hongwanji Mission (9/1981-2/1996) as their resident minister, and the State Headquarters as the 14th Bishop of Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii (3/1996-2/2007). The Hawaii Kyodan-Sponsored Funeral Service, which is currently being coordinated by the Office of the Bishop, will be held at Honpa Hongwanji Hawaii Betsuin on Saturday, April 30, 2016 under the officiation of Bishop Eric Matsumoto. The visitation will start at 9:30am followed by the Funeral Service at 10:30am.

SOCIAL CONCERN DONATION TO THE AMERICAN RED CROSS

Bishop Eric Matsumoto and Dean Sakamoto, Committee on Social Concerns Chair, presented a monetary donation to the American Red Cross Hawaii State Chapter, on March 21, 2016. The donation was made towards their International Relief Fund to support relief efforts for damage incurred at Fiji caused by Tropical Cyclone Winston where over 6,000 residents were placed in emergency shelters after their homes were damaged or swamped.

The donation was presented to Ms. Coralie Chun Matayoshi, Esq., Chief Executive Officer, Ms. Jennifer L. Dotson, Chief Development Officer (not in photo), and Mr. Scott Kramling, Fund Development Coordinator. The Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii have made donations in the past to the Red Cross to support relief efforts for Hurricanes Iselle and Sandy, Typhoon Haiyan, and other disasters.

The American Red Cross Hawaii Chapter will be observing their 100th Anniversary in 2017.



HAWAII FAITH-BASED SUMMIT ON HOMELESSNESS

The IHS, Institute for Human Services, with a mission to support those who need help and to respect all people's rights to live safely and with dignity, held a faith-based Summit on Homelessness at Central Union Church on March 14, 2016, co-sponsored by the Interfaith Alliance of Hawai'i. The intention was to involve faith communities to better a) meet the needs of homeless persons on their property, b) partner with non-profit and government service providers, and c) assist ministers, who are rooted in faith, to implement best practices.

Bishop Eric Matsumoto, Social Concerns Committee Chairperson Dean Sakamoto, and Rev. Satoshi Tomioka represented Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawai'i and attended the Summit. There were two plenary sessions and four workshops. The first plenary session by Connie Mitchell, IHS executive director was entitled "The changing face of homelessness: lessons learned during these past 37 years." The second session was by Doug Chin, Hawai'i State Attorney General, and his theme was "I will give you rest: Legal issues surrounding respite and housing." Each religious organization, Buddhist, Christian, Hindu, Muslim, and Jewish, submitted its perspectives about homelessness

Rev. Satoshi Tomioka remarked, "The purpose of this summit was to share our information and knowledge so that each of us can effectively contribute to solutions to end homelessness and cooperate with other religious organizations, volunteer groups, and government entities. As I work as a minister of Hongwanji and encounter people who are suffering from drugs, alcohol, low income, traumatic experiences, difficult family and human relationships, and loss of loved ones, I face the reality of suffering in Hawai'i. As I see people suffer, my attention to suffering has broadened to not only people I know in Hongwanji but also in the larger community. Homelessness is an ever-growing issue in Hawai'i. Some questions that came to my mind, as a minister, as a Buddhist, as a person who listens to the teachings of Amida Buddha, were 1) Do I want to end homelessness? 2) What can I do? My answer to question 1 was YES. Then, what can I do to contribute to solutions to end homelessness? This summit on homelessness was a great opportunity to learn the facts and information about how we can work together beyond the differences of faith. What we can do is learn about available shelters, services, and organizations for homeless in our community, and we can donate needed items. Amida Buddha's compassion is expressed as "Your suffering is my suffering. Your happiness is my happiness." Once we are touched by such compassion, we naturally let our own compassion, love, kindness and smile erupt to those who suffer and those who need kindness. Our happiness never decreases by being shared."
