Obon or Kangi-e (Gathering of Joy): The origin of Obon can be placed to the *Ullambaba Sutra*, which relates the story of Mogallana in Pali, the most gifted of Sakyamuni Buddha's disciples in the area of extraordinary sense perception. The story teaches the importance of hearing the Buddha's teaching and observing the precepts. In realizing the compassion of the Buddha, Mogallana was so overjoyed that he clapped his hands and danced about. This is said to have been the beginning of the *Bon Odori* (traditional Japanese dances on *Obon Day*).

Obon, therefore, being an occasion for rejoicing in the awakening offered by the Buddha, is an opportunity to express gratitude not only to ancestors, but to all who have passed on. Therefore, it is often referred to as *Kangi-e* "Gathering of Joy".

FLOATING LANTERNS

The Memorial Services for the dead have been observed by the Japanese since the introduction of Buddhism into Japan about 1,300 years ago. Formally observed annually in Japan on the mid-July lunar calendar, Obon memorial services and rituals have evolved and changed since the end of WWII.

At graveyards, the living pay homage and offer prayers for their dead. The tomb areas are cleaned and purified with clean water or sake and incense-burning. The offering of flowers and food-stuff vary dependent upon the likes of loved one(s). By night-fall, paper lanterns have already been strung on the graves to guide the way home for the spirits of the deceased on their way home. At homes, loved ones clean and prepare the shrine space. Making incense offerings, they speak to the spirits as if they were present. This special visit with their spirit guests seem as real as any ritual-affair of the day.

In front the family shrine, on a special table the ancestral tablets are placed. Tiny portions of the meal which includes the deceased favorite foods are offered and the Buddhist priest is brought in to console and comfort the souls of the dead on their journey from the other world and back with the chanting of sutra. A special course of food-items are had by all after this special memorial service honoring the dead.

At the close of O-bon, some items offered for this special memorial for the dead are placed in a small straw boat lit by candles or lanterns at the front of the vessel. At the back, incense is burned to purify the journey as the straw-ship is placed in a flowing river or the sea. This practice offers prayers to comfort those who have died with no company, other than the river or the sea. The mid-July Obon Festival and the New Year's celebration are the two major holiday events on the annual calendar that return family off-spring(s) to their home or place of birth. ("WE JAPANESE": Yamagata Press: C1949: p60.)

Buddhism Adapts to Cultures

Today, there are two major streams of Buddhism: *Theravada* - the "Teachings of the Elders" and, *Mahayana* - the "larger vehicle". Theravada is looked upon as the spirit of early Buddhism made up of the monastic order as its primary adherents or Sangha. The Mahayana movement has developed to include laity with the emphasis on spiritual liberation or supreme enlightenment accessible to everyone - monk and lay. We can see Mahayana as a broader river of new ideas, both spiritual and cultural, expanding into diverse schools of Buddhist thought and tradition.

A significant effect on society at large especially to family and communal living was the draw to lay-Buddhism as a natural outcome of the adaptation and growth of the Buddha's Teachings to a larger society namely, those unable to alter their stations in life. Buddhism of the laity may be considered like sister and brother to Theravada. As the Buddha's teachings made their way through various parts of Asia, Chinese, Korean and Japanese Buddhism, emphasized the moral and social virtues of "filial piety" and the "primacy of family."

Popular Practice of Lantern Floating

Clearly, the lantern floating ceremony - prayers for the dead spirits - have no spiritual foundation for the Hongwanji Jodo Shin Pure Land lineage inspired by Shinran Shonin (1173-1263). Shinran deeply reflecting within, awakened to "true-entrusting" - shinjin - the "Other-Power" *Nembutsu* Teaching of Amida Buddha's Primal Vow.

Referring to the letters of Shinran's wife, Eshinni, letters, we peer into Shinran's earlier family life as they enter the Kanto district at Sanuke of Kozuke province where he attempts a spiritual task which seems to contradict the Other-power Teaching of Amida Buddha's Vows. Relying on his self-works for attaining the liberation of all suffering beings, Shinran begins to read the Triple Pure Land Sutras 1,000 times.

On his 4th to 5th day of his chanting, however he suddenly realizes his error and stops. (Yoshiko Ohtani, "The Life of Eshinni - Wife of Shinran Shonin;" C.1990; p 30.)

In our Dharma Teaching of Birth By Faith Alone the source of that Faith-shinjin or the "true entrusting-heart" does not refer to our self-righteous capabilities or attitude, but rather, our awakening to having entrusted ourselves to Other-power, namely, secured in the natural unfolding of great compassion. It is the light of Dharma (Amida Buddha's Vows) that illuminates our blind passions especially accentuated by our self-righteous attitude awakened in our hearts to the unfolding of light or great compassion as gratitude for this unsurpassed compassion. Subsequently, Shinran Shonin's self-asserting attitude of chanting the Triple Pure Land Sutras 1,000 times for the sake of all suffering beings inspired him to cite the aspiration from Zendo Daishi or Shan-tao, the 5th spiritual Chinese Pure Land master's major theme - "Jishin Kyo Ninshin."

Inspired by the "Ojo Raisan - Hymns of Birth in the Pure Land" and its author, Shantao, the new world spiritual head, Sennyo (Kojun) Monshu Ohtani gifted his calligraphy of *Jishin kyo ninshin - "secure one's own entrusting heart to the great compassion, guiding others to the same pathway*" to every Hongwanji community to its 25th spiritual head. Its theme of "securing one's Faith and guiding others to the same" underscores a dynamic gratitude - the living gratitude of receiving and spreading great compassion in the Nembutsu. This foundation runs contrary to those who assert their self-righteous authority over special ritual and ceremonies that "pray for the peace of dead spirits."

This recent annual Shinnyo-En led Memorial Day event attracted over 6,000 lanterns and onlookers numbering over 50,000. Its largest social appeal for many, is a strong desire to "re-connect spiritually with loved ones who have passed away by means of large pageantry and exotic ritual and ceremony - Shinnyo-En provides this. Shinnyo-En provides this. We need not feel insecure by this ceremony, but simply appreciate it as an occasion for those remembering occasion for those remembering and reconnecting with their loved ones at this special event on the water.

My narrative hopes to shed some clarity and stimulate dialogue from a Shin Buddhist perspective. We should not presume that all our Hongwanji members already understand the "primacy of grateful practice to great compassion."

The symbol of light of the burning candle most certainly serves as a universal symbol to all forms of spirituality. In our modern Shin Buddhist communities, especially during the Obon season, it is common to hang lanterns as symbols of the Dharma's light as Amida Buddha's great compassion felt by all beings - past, present and future. In all of the temple communities I have served, lanterns have variously been displayed on temple grounds as well as in the temple inner sanctuaries. We do not observe the Obon season with service and dance because we *literally believe* that the spirits of our dead come back to visit us. Our remembrance of our loved ones' past can be best appreciated by how we listen, receive, reflect, understand and interpret their life struggles and lessons to better enrich and provide loving and caring examples for our everyday applications here today. It is not this observer's place to judge whether or not what Shinnyo-En is doing as part of this annual American Memorial Day Holiday is appropriate or not. It is my opinion, however that we as Shin Buddhists of the Pure Land pathway should better understand what we do, how we do, why we do, etc., motivated by our living gratitude to the Buddha's great compassion. In this 21st century more than ever, we should foremost be given to entrust...Namo Amida Butsu.

The Accession Ceremony (The Commemoration on the Accession of the Jodo Shinshu Tradition; <u>Dento Hokoku Hoyo</u> <u>伝灯奉告法要</u>) will be conducted from October 2016 through May 2017 (a total of 80 services) at our mother temple (Honzan) in Kyoto, Japan.

The Accession Ceremony is conducted before Amida Tathagata and Shinran Shonin to formally announce that the newly-inducted Head Priest (25th Gomonshu Kojun Ohtani) shall take on the responsibilities as Monshu, following in the footsteps of his predecessors to spread the Dharma to new generations and embracing the opportunity to spread the Nembutsu teaching to a greater number of people. It is also a festive occasion welcoming everyone to celebrate the inauguration of the new Monshu.

"MINDFUL AMERICA" AUTHOR TO SPEAK

HONOKA'A, Hawai'i Island—With a 2,500-year-old history, Buddhism is not often thought of as contemporary. However, according to respected author and scholar Dr. Jeff Wilson, one Buddhistic practice, "mindfulness," is sweeping across America and finding a place in the workplace, classroom, medical centers, movies and more.

Dr. Wilson will speak about this phenomenon, as detailed in his most recent book "Mindful America," on Thursday, July 21, 2016 at the North Hawai'i Education and Research Center (NHERC) in Honoka'a at 7 p.m. The event is free and all are encouraged to attend, regardless of faith or religious background.

Defined as "the practice of maintaining a nonjudgmental state of heightened or complete awareness of one's thoughts, emotions, or experiences on a moment-to-moment basis," mindfulness is a type of meditation focused on the breath. It can be done in the familiar posture—seated, cross-legged, eyes closed—or while walking, working or eating.

Buddhism is one of the longest surviving of our large religious traditions," says Wilson. "But one of Buddhism's enduring insights is precisely that *all things change*, and Buddhism has managed to reach such a respectable age only by countless changes."

"The incredible speed with which new developments are occurring within the mindfulness movement is one of the unique aspects of the encounter of Asian and Western cultures in the fast-paced, competitive, capitalistic, globalized world we now inhabit." says Wilson

Wilson, associate professor of religious studies and East Asian studies at Renison University College, is the author of numerous books on the adaption of Buddhism and mindfulness in America, including "Dixie Dharma" and "The Buddhist Guide to New York."

The program, a project of the Commission on Buddhist Education, Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawai'i, starts with a potluck dinner at 6 p.m. Participants are asked to bring their own plate, cup and utensils.
