JOYOUS GATHERING (KANGI-E)

Aloha and mahalo for inviting me to the Keei Buddhist Church and Cemetery for your annual Obon Graveside service; Bon Service and Dance Festival on this splendid Saturday evening. Your volunteers have worked hard to make this a beautiful occasion for renewing old friendships and making new ones. Let us pause in spiritual togetherness for a moment of rededication...

We honor the love and sacrifices of loved ones' past, present and future at this ultimate moment of human life - already grasped by great compassion. Their lives and love continue to echo the virtues of gratitude and joy, the heart of family and community. These Obon festivities - rather they be at graveside, service in temple, dancing around your nature's yagura - all celebrate an unbroken lineage of human families and generations in a togetherness of the Heart that always bind us as one in the Buddha's great compassion. NamoAmidaButsu, NaManDaBu...

Obon is often called, the "festival of lanterns or lights". Universal to all cultures, light is drawn to shadow as the Dharma's wisdom-light reveals the shadow of the human heart. Obon is a mixture of various cultures that made its way to Hawaii and the rest of the world: From Indian Buddhism came the custom of feasting, revering the religious and the gods of lights. The Indian festival of lights - Divali - honoring seven generations back by burning lights to 'welcome and send-off' loved ones. From China the Hindu custom of lights mixed with the Taoist square lanterns to honor and venerate ancestors.

The Japanese Buddhist Obon festival centers around the legend of Maha-Maudgalyana, aka, Mokuren - an especially gifted disciple of the Buddha. He envisioned his own mother suffering the realm of insatiable hunger and thirst. The middle-way teachings have at least two aspects of truth: form and formless; seen and unseen: the formless Buddha-dharma takes its form as Amida Buddha's Vows of great compassion, i.e., NamoAmidaButsu, NaManDaBu. Seeking Sakyamuni Buddha's spiritual advice, Mokuren is told to make offerings from the mountain, the valley and the sea to the Sangha at the height of their summer retreat. Having made them, Mokuren is relieved to find his mother's plight liberated from perpetual clinging along with seven family generations. Jumping up in the air, he begins to dance joyfully. This account

serves as an early inspiration for Bon or UraBon - the affliction of hanging up-side-down. The legend of Mokuren and his mother illuminates a spiritual telling of our deeply rooted clinging to our loved ones, even as we are urged to seek the liberating pathway of the Dharma.

The Nishi-western branch of the Japanese Pure Land Teachings traces its spiritual lineage to Shinran Shonin (1173-1263). Shinran's revolutionary outlook saw the Buddha's single Vow-mind as our true spiritual source. This source enables our "true-entrusting" in the Buddha's great compassion requiring no placating of wandering lost spirits with food, drink and prayers and exotic ritual-ceremony.

The earliest forms of Buddhism introduced into China, Korea and Japan were tied to imperial and court patronage. Prayers sponsored by the elites served to protect them from wrathful, vengeful spirits who died as victims of intrigue and war. Instead, Shinran experiences together with the lowly and ordinary, a truly honest and genuine connection brought about in the hearts with co-travelers to the Buddha's great compassion. Simply entrust ourselves in Amida's great compassion - life's deepest meaning and our source of gratitude.

For all loved ones, the Obon festival is **NOT FOR** our loved ones, **BUT BECAUSE OF** our loved ones! As long as we live, all are subject to the confusion of karmic forces - seen and seen. All existence, however encounters - Amida's Heart of "true-entrusting" - the benevolent kindness of great compassion for our birth in the Pure Land. "Birth in the Pure Land" does not mean 'resting in peace in paradise to imply a passive static state of personal bliss, indifferent to the rest of this world.

Contrary to our personal successes in life, how that life is genuinely extended to future generations by arousing curiosity and education that uplifts our shared-humanity to a higher plateau captures the dynamic spirit of the founder's vision of "true self-benefitting is "benefitting-others". Birth in the Pure Land as "going forth" and "returning -from" the Pure Land mirrors the Buddha's attainment that mutually benefit self and others" - sharing our pathway of great compassion with others in everyday living. Thank you everyone for coming. Drive safely to/from the Bon activities. Refresh yourselves in this season of dancing and fellowship. Mahalo & Arigatou! NaManDa, NaManDabu, NaManDaBu...
