OUR SPIRITUAL ANCHOR

What is our spiritual anchor like in our life? Our spiritual anchor must be the foundation of our life and everyday living. No matter how many stories a home has, if the foundation is weak and cannot hold the weight of everything built upon it, with the slightest shaking of the foundation, the home will collapse. Our spiritual foundation or anchor functions in the same way. Despite the building shaking a little or taking 'earth-pounding' jolts, if the foundation remains firmly rooted and unshakeable, it can weather all things.

Is this not also the same with the Faith of Nembutsu-shinjin given over to each and all of us for true- entrusting of Amida tathagata's great compassion?

Honen Shonin declared:

[My] Genku's shinjin is shinjin received from the Tathagata. Zenshin's shinjin is also shinjin bestowed by the Tathagata. Hence [they] are wholly one... Tannisho: A Primer: A Record of the words of Shinran set down in lamentation over departures from his teaching; translated Dennis Hirota; c1982;p 125.

Honen's (Genku) and Shinran's (Zenshin) spiritual anchor or foundation is the Nembutus-shinjin of true-entrusting given over by Amida tathagata's Primal Vow. It is the basis and meaning of Shinran's assertion that Nembutsu-shinjin alone is true and real.

Shinjin is the vow-mind of Amida Tathagata's wisdom and compassion given over to beings so far removed from the life and teachings of Sakyamuni Buddha. It is "true-entrusting" the wondrous and benevolent activity of great compassion awakened in persons who utter the Nembutsu as thanksgiving.

This shinjin is not "two" or "three" or "four" and is **not dependent on the differing practices or virtues** of each person; This shinjin is One - the One dynamic vow-mind of Amida Tathagata's wisdom as great compassion given over freely to the beings of this period incapable of

any practice whatsoever. It is..."the shinjin of the foolish person [I am]. Beyond this, whether you entrust yourself, taking up the nembutsu, or whether you abandon it, is your own, individual decision. Thus were his words. **Ibid.**, p 59

As we dharma brothers and sisters pass beyond the Obon season into the Autumn Higan, we are reminded of our Monshu Ohtani Kojun calligraphy hanging prominently in the temple: "Jishin Kyo Ninshin"- secure one's own entrusting to great compassion, guiding others to the same pathway. Though we sometimes forget, each of us aspires to live with a firm of meaning, dignity and gratitude. This meaning depends upon always returning to its foundation - the basis upon which all that comes after depends upon. So for each and for all of us, we are reminded to return to our source of all life's meaning - the entrusting heart of great compassion embodied in everyday living.

Shinran offered a spiritual model known as "turning through the Vows" or Sangan Tennyu by which our spirtual evolution or pathway is informed by the 18th Primal Vow. The 19th and 20th vows remain as vital links that bring us into the 18th Primal Vow. From good works (non-meditative practices) through reciting the Nembutsu (meditative practices), we are brought into the great compassionate vow of the 18th Primal Vow - the Nembutsu of thanksgiving.

In other words when we consider deeply our daily living embraced by great compassion, no matter the self-reasoning and design we take to live struggling along life's pathways, we should also realize that they are deeply anchored in and lead to the benevolent heart of great compassion.

As we reflect through the Autumn Higan season when the climate is not too hot or too cold, we are reminded of the bodhisattvas's practices of the six paramitas for attaining enlightenment. They are: dana -charity; observing precepts; perseverance; energy; meditation; and prajna-wisdom. If there is any good that is possible, it is rooted in the great compassion - the ground and basis of true and real gratitude. NaManDaBu, NaManDaBu...

On that Saturday night, our Bon Dance may have been the best one in the State! Most of the dances in East Hawaii and Maui were cancelled; and some of the ones on Oahu experienced heavy rain! And in Kona... the morning greeted us with a beautiful double-rainbow over the temple... gorgeous blue skies appeared as we setup of the yagura, tents, and lanterns... overcast skies came in the late-afternoon / evening during the Lantern Parade and Bon Dance... and it stayed clear through clean up and take down... perfect! This was the best weather Kona Hongwanji has experienced for a bon dance in many years!

Perhaps this is a reflection of our daily life... we can "plan" for many things, but life has a way of not following "plans". The Buddha-Dharma tells us to live in the present... to enjoy and appreciate the now! While we did "worry" about whether or not the night would continue to hold good weather... we truly enjoyed the bon dance as it unfolded! Thank you to **REVEREND SATOSHI TOMIOKA** for dancing throughout the night with your "Pokemon" mask! Thank you to **KONA DAIFUKUJI TAIKO** for your heart-pounding taiko; **RANDAL SMITH** for the exhilarating Zumba dancing; the **Jr. YBA** for the "ono" food; and **KONA HONGWANJI TAIKO GROUP** for the wonderful drumming to our bon dance songs! 
Minister's Corner

Confessions of a "Generation Xer"

As a result of the annual legislative assembly, I have been wondering what it means to be born as a part of Generation X. For those of you not familiar with the term, it is a demographic label given to those that were born in the 1960s all the way to the 1980s. In a recent 2014 Pew Research study, Generation X people were considered to be the "Neglected Middle Child" being that we are between the two largest generations, which are also the generations that differ the most.

In our generation, we saw music change from records to tapes, then CDs to digital music players like the iPod. We saw the rotary phone turn into the touch tone and then cellular phones. We were the generation that saw the first music video on an "All-Music Station" called MTV.

We saw on television the Chernobyl Disaster, the end of the Cold War, and we learned via Sesame Street. Economically, we are highly educated, but paid more and longer for college because our loans were at a higher rate than the generations before us enjoyed. When we graduated from college, we had no job, so many defaulted on their loans and ended up bankrupt.

Generation X is an interesting generation. The outcome to all the events in our lives has surely determined what we deem as important and how we set our priorities. As a result, we've turned very individualistic, cynical, and have disrespect for authority especially for the baby boomers, which sociologist argues, "made us this way."

One of the things that Generation Xers had to learn was to be adaptable. In being able to adapt our lives to include the Teachings into our lives, we see that the natural byproduct is living a life not only of happiness, but of appreciation and gratitude. When you really think about it, although much of the life of a Generation Xer revolves around the "self" and the "me", in adapting, we've learned to take care of each other and resurrect an old Greek concept and made it cool, we call it "Paying it Forward." I know many of you have benefited from this. Although we may not be able to afford it, we still do it out of the kindness of our hearts. This is called selfless giving in Buddhism.

For Generation Xers, religion is at the bottom of the list. We grew up in a generation that went to church as young children, but never grasped religion, because we never quite understood what was going on.

I believe that the Teachings of Shinran Shōnin was made just for us Xers and the generations that have preceded us and will follow us. In his time, Shinran made accessible the Teachings to everyone, so that they too could find the comfort of being embraced in Amida Buddha's Infinite Wisdom and Compassion.

Even if we don't have time for Amida, Amida always has time for us. In the writings of Shinran, he states, "Although I too am within Amida's grasp, blind passions obstruct my eyes and I cannot see him; nevertheless, great compassion untiringly and constantly illuminates me."

Coming to church offers us that opportunity each week to escape the world that obstructs our eyes and focus on ourselves spiritually and mentally. We should make every effort to be able to celebrate the working of Amida Buddha and express the Teachings through Sūtra chanting, celebrating the teaching by singing Buddha's Praises, hear the Buddha's Teachings through our shared experiences, and most importantly, take care of ourselves and our loved ones.

Often I joke that I too don't go to church on Sundays, because I have to work. However, I do cherish going to church services when I can not only hear the messages of my fellow ministers, but also others that share in our journey on the road of the Nembutsu.
