Good morning sisters and brothers. This morning after the service, along with fire-experience volunteers, we will gather at the lowerend of the KHBT cemetery for a short service ending with the burning of religious articles.

This annual event collects items set aside by members and friends for proper handling and burning. An old shrine turned in for burning due to termite rot and age; Amulets - "omamori" given to members by loved ones in prayer sentiment during crisis or upon returning from a Japan tour; Religious items from other traditions no longer used by the family. Perhaps the most challenging point for the turning in of the family shrine and related items is offsprings' perceptions that the "Buddha shelf" is no longer a vital spiritual symbol that connects family from the past into the future.

Please note some of these items were imported from Japan and treasured as religious heirlooms to be passed on to the next generation. Pure Land religious symbols point to our deepest experiences of Faith (Shinjin as 'True-Entrusing) in the Buddha's great compassion. They should not be simply discarded like rubbish at the landfill. Respectfully accompanied by a short service, said items are burned together at service's end.

Citing Rennyo Shonin regarding all human life in this existence, "in the morning, we may have radiant health, but by evening we have turned to white ashes"..., this truth and reality apply to even the most simple of things already joined by Great Compassion, no matter how seemingly small. Thus, our Eighth Abbot writes, "who neglects even a scrap of paper on the floor that may come to lead us to the Vow of the Buddha's great compassion?"

Of course for Shin Buddhists, the Butsudan or the Buddha's shelf is a religious symbol of our deep, abiding connection to great compassion through those who love and care for us in this life. What was the historical connection or basis requiring the "Buddha's shelf" (Burtudan) in all homes up in Japanese history? There are many pieces of history, personal and social we can learn and apply today. As readers and viewers of various genre, real and fiction - we are usually drawn to stories about winners and happy endings.

In actual human life and circumstance however, human beings are tested with trials as if the world was stacked against them. Some might wonder where we stand in the great scheme of things? Is there truly a loving God in His workings in his activity of humankind? Does He or She really care and how does that care come alive in the hearts of the faithful and His Christian community?

<u>Silence</u> as a whole is a fictional novel taken partly from Japan's historical backdrop interwoven with a story of two Christian Jesuit priests who must risk their lives to follow the command of Jesus during a period of brutal persecution. This takes place from 1590 into the 250 year period called the Edo period 1603-1868 during Japan's isolationism.

When Toyotomi Hideyoshi united Japan in 1590, this set off a dramatic shift in political, economic and religious changes in feudal society. He saw a great threat to Japan's fragile unity trying to counter the powers of the European "black ships" with their trade and commerce and the growing influence of the new Christian movement into Japan. And while trade continued, Hideyoshi sought to curb the Christian influence over the power and authority of his government.

Though laws severely restricted commoners contact with westerners, the government began a purge of Christian converts. By 1597, Hideyoshi ordered the execution of twenty-six (26) Christian converts. All of them were tortured, mutilated and paraded in public, then crucified for all to see as a severe warning in the city province of Nagasaki.

As Japan entered the Edo period, the persecutions grew still grimmer. The novel's author, Shusako Endo refers to the 1637 Shimabara Rebellion as a protest to both, unfair taxes and the Christian persecutions. After thousands of men, women and children were murdered - at least 35,000 by historical accounting, the uprising was suppressed, squelching the seeds of the Christian Faith and driving Japan's remaining converts into hiding.

Endo sets <u>Silence</u> about fifty years into this period of persecutions of the Kakure (hidden) Christians using the experiences of three Jesuit priests to launch this novel. The covert arrival of these Jesuit priests aided the hidden Christians left while performing Rites in secret without holy water, wine or bread. In all, the Kakure Christians are profoundly grateful for their presence and spiritual comfort.

As a historical point, Shinto and Buddha shelves were required for issue to every household by the government This should demonstrate the loyalty by the populace to the native Kami and Buddhas and to no "foreign diety". The irony however, is that hidden Christians prayed to the vision of Mother Mary through the image of Kannon Bosatsu - the Bodhisattva of Compassion at their household shrines. In effect however, the Shinto and Buddhist clerics were ordered to serve as agents of the state keeping concise statistics of births, persons and family movements, weddings, deaths, etc., - literally becoming the eyes of the government keeping the populace in-check for anything suspicious.

In the face of such devotion and unnerving persecution, shouldn't God bless his flock by at least protecting them from harm? Jesus said he would be present for them, but where was he to found in the face of brutal persecutions and wholesale murder even for those now remaining in hiding? Wouldn't Jesus and the Holy Spirit sustain them in this life, while promising to deliver them in the Life to come? And how would Jesus judge those Japanese who rejected their Faith in the face of torture and death?

Author, Shusaku Endo with an unflinching sense of brutal honesty and insight, tells a story of two men who must choose between the loss of their lives or their Faith. In a very deep, and profound way, <u>Silence</u> is a story that challenge human circumstance and Faith colliding at the deepest parts of our humanity.
