The Confirmation or "Kikyoshiki" Rite is a solemn ceremony performed in the presence of Amida Buddha and Shinran Shonin. This ceremony formally confirms our entry onto the Nembutsu Pathway in refuge to the Three Treasures of Buddha, Dharma and Sangha.

"Buddha" is not limited to the historical Sakyamuni Gotama Buddha, but to living in the wondrous flow of great compassion or Amida Buddha's Vow inspired by the life and teachings of Shinran. "Dharma" is the teachings of great compassion that do not discriminate against race, national ideology, gender or age embracing all without fail. Sangha refers to all peoples bound together by the all-emcompassing great compassion awakened in their entrusting hearts.

Participants to this Kikyoshiki will receive a *Homyo* or Dharma Name. This Name signifies one taking refuge in the Three Refuges. Thus each Dharma Name is joined by the prefix "Shaku" or Dharma aspirant of Sakyamuni and all Buddhas who host the virtues of great wisdom and compassion.

BUDDHIST ASPIRATION: Congresswoman Colleen Hanabusa shared a Buddhist Aspiration, “**Buddhist Wisdom**” at the 115th Congress Bipartisan Prayer Service in Washington D.C. The prayer service included Christian and Hindu readings. The Aspiration shared by Ms. Colleen Hanabusa:

BUDDHIST WISDOM

The revered Three Treasures of Buddhism are the Buddha, the Dharma and the Sangha. It seeks the peace, happiness and well-being of all existence. May we all be guided and inspired by the Three Treasures, however, today we especially emphasize the importance of those in leadership roles be effective, open, thoughtful, wise and compassionate in their endeavors.

Of the Buddha, it is said, “The Buddha harbors no thought of greed, hatred or malice, nor does the Buddha allow any ideas of greed, hatred or malice to arise. Possessed of the power to persevere, the Buddha does not avoid personal challenges and difficulties to accomplish the goals set forth. Having little desire of one’s own self, the Buddha knows contentment. With facial expression of tenderness and kindness of speech, the Buddha speaks to others in consonance with their inner thoughts. Courageous and diligent, disciplined and untiring, the Buddha pursued the pure Dharma, the Teachings or Truth, thereby benefitting the multitudes. Buddha shares the great storehouse of merit with others.”

Of the Buddha, some important guiding principles include, "Human beings tend to move in the direction of their thoughts. Whatever words we utter should be chosen with care for people will hear them and be influenced by them for good or ill. If one wishes to follow the Buddha's Teaching, one must not be egotistic or self-willed, but should cherish feeling of good will toward all alike; one should respect those worthy of respect; one should serve those who are worthy of service and treat everyone with uniform kindness'.

Of the Sangha, the community says, "Thousands of people may live in the community, but it is not a true community until all people know each other and have empathy for one another. A true community has faith and wisdom that illuminate it. It is a place where people know and trust one another and there is harmony'.

May the Light of All-Inclusive Wisdom and All Embracing Compassion guide and illumine the hearts and minds of all people of all nations, so our thoughts, words, and action may bring understanding, peace, harmony and happiness, equally, to both self and others in our local, national and global community.

JOURNEY IS THE GOAL PART II

In the last issue, I shared with our readers a brief outline on the Four Noble Truths and the Eight-fold Noble Path. And while the majority of members and temple goers rely on these basic principles as a backdrop and moral guidance and ethical living, I have found it difficult to near impossible, despite my best efforts to fulfill them. It's not that we don't try to apply the Four Noble Truths and Eight-fold Noble Path to our daily living; but these basic Buddhist principles in effect, highlight our limits and inabilities in our daily struggles as with our three poisons of greed, anger and stupidity (arrogance).

It is no wonder that in the development of lay Buddhism, Honen and Shinran were considered pioneers bringing the Buddha's great vows directly to those truly incapable of carrying out the ideals of monastic living. Even by Honen and Shinran's time, many monks cloistered on Mount Hiei during the day returned to their wives-children at night at the base of the mountain. It is Shinran Shonin however, who openly marries with the consent of his master, Honen, unwilling to conceal the duplicitous behavior of many in his time.

For us today, as it was so for Shinran back then, the essential spirit of the Buddha's Teaching enables us to live in the boundless flow of great compassion. The heart of the Pure Land pathway highlights our "true and real" selves - or simply what it means to become truly human in the light of the Buddha's great compassion.

At a recent visit from the HHMH Mission School 4th graders, teachers and chaperones, Kona Hongwanji welcomed their annual pilgrimage on campus. Ours was the first stop in a full activity program that covers the City of Refuge, Volcano and most certainly, shopping.

Upon arrival, they offered a Hawaiian chant of Welcome and Blessing, then came into the temple for short introductions. As they closed their portion, they chanted in unison, "Amida Buddha's Golden Chain of Love" before exiting for the rest of their campus visit.

Peering into these young faces, I was reminded that all will experience challenges throughout the various changes of their lifecycles. Coming into adulthood, many themes for maturity will engage family, education and larger community. Experience and growth patterns will enlarge their journey as seekers of their "true and real" selves. New friendships, higher education, club interactions and even getting a part-time job or a driver's license will all figure into a larger puzzle of life in the real world.

And in that mix of growing and maturing in their life experiences, will too, bring the painful, downside of life turns that will be just as honest and real - equally vital to that of education, friendships, professional careers and even growing into one's own family life. Thus, witnessing family members getting older and sick, taking on becoming a caregiver for parents or grandparents who must brave increasing physical and emotional limitations are all part to the course of human living and dying. And though we might entertain the thought at first, confronting unforeseen crisis facing a loved one or even ourselves facing a medical crisis reflect the rhythm and seasons of life-itself.

When all is said and done, there is no one else who can take your place for a loved one meeting illness and finally death and its accompanying grief. Amidst our loss and pain, we are ever mindful of that love and compassion sustaining us to live a life without any regrets.

In the words of Dr. Mark Unno, "we shall always remain deeply and truly connected to those we love. Is it not our shared sadness and gladness received that remain as the most greatest of joys in our life journey together? Our shared sadness and gladness are ever flowing into the waters of great compassion. Each day and each moment, though at times, we seem unaware, has become an honest and real blessing - ups or downs, sadness or gladness, success or failure, exceptional or ordinary, young or old, man or woman - all without fail move on a pathway that is true and real - together in the Buddha's great compassion.

Thus our unison reading, "Amida Buddha's Golden Chain of Love" takes on a renewed meaning each time we reflect upon its content. Throughout that life journey, a profound shift has returned us to our primary source that is great compassion flowing from moment to moment in the present-now. As our communities engage the Season of Obon in June-July-August - the beautiful remembrances through services and dances honoring loved ones who have returned to the Pure Land, remind us joyfully our debt of Appreciation to all beings in the past, present and future.
