Ancient legend tells us that during the time of the Buddha, one of his disciples, Mogallana, saw with his superhuman sight of the agony of his mother as she suffered in the lowest hell. When this fact was brought to the attention of the Blessed One, his heart was moved with great compassion. Through the grace of his all-embracing compassion the woman was saved. Mokuren Sonja and his disciples clapped their hands in joy. The legend says this was the origin of the Obon odori. Obon therefore being an occasion for rejoicing in the salvation offered by the Buddha, is referred to as a "Gathering of Joy". Obon is essentially a memorial service honoring the memory of the deceased. But that is as far as it goes in coinciding with other memorial service. Instead of being a solemn occasion a festive mood pervades the entire gathering. Although the sense of loss of our loved one is strong in our hearts, our faith in Amida's Wisdom and Compassion is even stronger

Mahalo Mr. Imai: Thank you Mr. Akinori Imai for being our photographer. Mr. Imai, a retired school teacher has been at many of our functions and taking pictures of various individuals and activities during the event. He has been doing this for many years and presents the church with a booklet of the event. Thank you Mr. Imai.

After sixty-four plus years of marriage, children, grand and great-grand-children, her husband lamented that she had not lived long enough to enjoy her life. His wife was diagnosed was dementia just after her retirement at 65 years old. As her dementia progressed, it developed into Alzheimers despite, her four daughters, grandchildren, and her husband looking after her.

Dad helped whenever possible. Being a "workaholic", after the mandatory retirement age, he continued work in the security division of his construction company. Dad worked six days a week and on holidays and with the advance of mom's illness, he counted on his company's medical benefits and Medicare to carry them through their twilight years.

Yes, our mom had a difficult life but, growing up all our family worked together. In addition to our parents working full-time at blue-collar jobs, a full-time farm took a big part of our family life. Keeping hogs, cattle and other livestock were part of the family's daily work schedule. Mom's day started early each morning getting dad's lunch-pail ready, and enough foodstuff (especially, meats) to start the kids off for school without having to say so. Daily family's dinners for eight people plus several cousins in-tow in middle school made for hectic non-stop schedules.

Growing up together was a precious time for all of us. At times, mom and dad fought. The pain mama endured throughout their 'stormy marriage' had her at times, literally retreating into a dark storage closet in the basement when our dad went out to "meet his friends". There were times when I sat with her in the dark closet late at night: I would ask her. "Mama - why don't you divorce dad if, no can help? "Her response: "When you grow up, get married and have children someday, you'll find out Bruce".

Dad, as much as we loved him was also a 'social butterfly'. After his day job at the construction site, dad's trek to the restaurants collecting 'slop' always made time to sit and have coffee with the ladies. At times, mom and us kids had to wait for the 'slop' at the pig pens because it was the two boys' job to fill the huge cooking drum and cook the batch for the next day. By the time we went into the house for dinner and of course, our homework, it was usually after 7:30pm. Dad's simple philosophy was, "Hard work no going kill anyone. Hard work keeps the family together and strong." And every evening without fail, Dad put his hand out and got his "\$20" spending money. Then he hit his "drinking hangout".

There were times when after the older sisters got their drivers' licenses, mom and the girls went out looking for dad at his hangouts late at night. Mama literally took him by the ear at the bar, dragging him into the car doggedly, taking him home. She always said to him, "You want to drink until you get so drunk, its' up to you, but you're gonna get up the early next morning and go to work!"

Mom always said to the children in moments of calm, "Your dad loves to play hard, but he works really hard providing for our family. At times its really hard, but he's basically a good man". All those years must have taken its toll on mama's life despite, her "gaman" - repressing her anger and frustration as much she could keep it at bay. As she often came to his defense, it seems she was also trying to assure herself, even more than she wanted to assure us.

In mom's moments of larger retrospect, sitting down at the dining table, she told us - "you children and your dad are both, a source of my deep pain and suffering, as well as, the deep source of my happiness and joy!". These words will always resonate in me as long as I live:

...Hard to abandon is this old home of suffering where we have been turning in transmigration from kalpas in the far distant past to the present, and we feel no longing for the Pure Land of Peace where we have yet, to be born truly this because our blind passions are so very powerful and pervasive...

"Tannisho: A Primer, A Record of Words of Shinran Set Down in Lament Over Departures From His Teachings"; Translation: Dennis Hirota; C.1982; page 75 After twenty plus years suffering the confusion and pain of Alzheimers, mom suffered a massive heart attack and was ambulanced to Hilo Medical Center. She suffered a lifetime from low blood pressure and had to get blood transfusions. She also ate beef liver as part of her regimen. The only option open to her according to the doctor, was trying to thin her blood with medication.

Within two hours, my sister Lorna - the primary care-giver for both mom and dad and oldest sister, called me late pm. July 11, 2017. Mom died as our oldest sister, Lorna and the rest of the family encouraged her at bedside with the "ONembutsu". And though mama must have felt fearful, even confused up to the moment she died, she said "Namo Amida Butsu" with her daughters.

...But though we feel regret at parting from this world at the moment when, helplessly, our life ends, with karmic bonds to this saha (life of struggle) world runs out, we will go to the Pure Land..."Tannisho: A Primer...lbid., p 75.

During our family's bereavement, I took the opportunity to share words of reflection to those I wrote thank you cards for their Koden - condolence gifts - on behalf of my father and rest of the family:

"...Thank you so kindly for your thoughtful condolence gift and love visiting our dad and remembering our beloved mama.

Dear Mom & Dad:

Even as your lives dimmed into twilight, your love and guidance shone even brighter in our hearts and lives. Our bewilderment and tears have turned to peaceful calm and precious gratitude.

We realize now, that after-all, your love and light have always been none other than the deep and abiding warmth of the Buddha's Great Compassion. Mom & Dad - Arigatou for showing us the Way. Namo Amida Butsu.

Gratefully in the Loving Light Ichiro Nakamura Families"

On this recent Mother's Day, as is now my custom as I get older with family, expressing my gratitude to my wife is the first thing I share with a simple card. Yet, without any thought, rising each the morning and just before retiring at bedtime. I am drawn before the Buddha shrine and with my hands together, the Nembutsu of the Buddha's gracious Vow now remains for me the veritable source of spiritual respite and sole refuge. And throughout the 30 plus of ministry serving others, I've finally learning to be happy for myself as I know that my mother's continence is always smiling upon me with her smile and laughter. On a simpler, yet, most profound note. I plan meeting my mother once again in the spiritual future.

My family will observe the first Obon of Our Mom on July 11th this year. Reflecting through the legend of Mokuren and his mother, I cannot help but, envision my own mother and father's love and sacrifice bound to family solely defining their very source of happiness and sorrow too, was the very object of the Buddha's Great Compassion.

...I have never said the Name even once for the repose of my departed father and mother. For all living things have been my parents and brothers and sisters in the course of countless lives in many states of existence. Upon attaining Buddhahood in the next life, I must save every one of them

Were saying the Name indeed a good act in which a person strove through his own powers, then he might direct the merit thus gained toward saving his father and mother. But this not the case. If however, he simply abandons such self-power and quickly attains enlightenment in the Pure Land, he will be able to save all beings with transcendent powers and compassionate means; whatever karmic suffering they may be sinking into in the six realms and the four modes of birth, beginning with those with whom his life is deeply bound.
