A MERE REED

Even, suffer a slow death from an incurable illness.

And while the whole world might crush him instantly, like a fly.
This thinking reed is also man who knows he is going to die.
Hence, man has a kind of nobility,
A noble, dignity a world-apart from the very thing that kills him.

Thus, that which fills man's life with nobility
Is precisely too, that which makes man so pitiable.
This very contradiction so makes pitiable, noble man.

ANONYMOUS: (The timeless
Voice of Great Compassion)

Greetings dear family members and friends of the KHBT. This month's article is my last shared with you. I am genuinely grateful for our Dharma friendships through the Nembutsu of Great Compassion. Wherever we go, the Dharma treasury of Great Compassion ever supports and guides us. Na Man Da Butsu...

During the months of harvest in Asia, the earth, family and tutelary spirits are honored and celebrated in community. In human history, for a largely agricultural culture, the harvest months were also a time to celebrate fertility, renewal and family. In China, Korea, Japan and now in America and Hawaii, we trace the season of the Obon festival through the harvest season from June through August. Its high point on the lunar calendar is July 15th - the date which joins the full moon's appearance in the night sky to the festival that venerates a time for spiritual renewal and an unbroken connection to communities.

The anonymous prose read at start mirrors a brief yet, succinct truth and reality for all existence - all human beings. This poem was sitting in my pending file awaiting its final version for mailing to my dad who lives at the edge of Hilo on the west side of the Big Island.

I'm certain there isn't a day that goes by that my dad doesn't think of his wife and our mother who died on July 11th just one year ago at the age of 86. Mom and dad were blue-collar workers all their lives and fortunately, even with six children, dad's full-time construction job earned enough throughout the growing years, when the family needed it the most. Mom was a homemaker when the kids were small and later worked for years at Robert's Bakery and then, for several years at Ebesus' Flower Shop until she retired at age 65.

And while we should be grateful to our parents of over 65 years of marriage and their family of six children, 18 grandchildren and nine great grandchildren, mom developed Alzheimers becoming progressively worse in excess of 20 years. Our family and our sisters in particular, attentively cared for her at home with the assist of the rest of the family, including dad. Within the year before mom's death, she could no longer recognize her husband and family. Due to a lifetime of low blood pressure (anemia) mom, had a massive heart attack and died within hours as dad and most family members surrounded her to ease her final moments.

Though mom did not know anyone, my sister Lorna guided her with the Nembutsu up to the final moments mom breathed her last. Though I would not be surprised, mom was frightened, the sound of the Nembutsu might have brought her some comfort, perhaps even solace. In those final moments, I do not really know what transpired.

Amidst the chaos of family life, I can certainly say, mom was the rock on which the whole family stood. Even as teenagers in high school, sitting at the dining table and dad, the social butterfly out with his friends, mom would say to her children: "dad works very hard and he also plays very hard but, he is basically, a decent and good man." And after a pause, mom would say, "dad and all of you children are a source of both my deepest suffering and too, my deepest happiness! These very words will always be etched in me as long as I have human life.

As I deeply reflect on my family life, I can truthfully say, "my mother's life was solely lived for her children's happiness over her own. Mom would not put her own life before anyone. Even when we were in elementary school, she would prepare a Christmas, holiday basket for a Filipino Family down the street. I went with her at least, once. She wouldn't even knock on the door waiting for someone to come out to say,

"thank you". Selfishly, I can say her life was one-sided, in other words, she never thought about herself, even if she wanted to. From a modern perspective her life was extreme, focused on others. The selfless wonder however, is, for her, it was not words, but actions that counted foremost. On the other hand, rage sometimes consumed her amidst her dementia. I was especially painful for Dad and our oldest sister - Lorna.

Mom, like dad didn't say, "I love you" to their children, especially, beyond the crib. That was the generational reality of most parents-grandparents of that time. This brings me to the second point - saying "I love you" came from me much later in life only after, into my forty's. It didn't come with a birthday card or email. It came in a direct yet, clear voice on her birthday when mom had reached into her late-sixty's. I was already serving ministry away from home, and was surprised, even taken-aback with the response in her voice as I closed my phone call with her, "Take care Brucy - I love you too!". From that time on, all our conversations ended with "I love you."

There may be some of you like me, who most of their adult years, didn't get to hear those three simple yet, important words - "I love you". And in practice, the human heart as action counts over words. But, we like to hear those three simple words from the heart - "I love you". It won't start unless, you don't just say or write it down from you side to begin with from the get-go. On the other hand, parents today are always saying to their kids or grand-kids - "I love you!". Might that be in response to the generation before?

Finally, to those who have not yet, "stepped-up" to say, "I love you" to someone who mattered most in your life all along more so, just say, "I love you mom; I love you dad; I love you jiji I love you baba", etc. Don't wait until it's almost over or ended to say what is so true and real. And in that moment of deepest, human joy enable to say, "I love you!" or to hear, "I love you" from another, "NaManDaBu, NaManDaBu" will also be revealed, simply and clearly from the Buddha's Heart as, "I love you and embrace you always!" That simply means we are together as One always in life and beyond death, **because of the very limits and frailties** we otherwise, should have realized all along life's pathway especially, when it mattered.

Today at the age of 88, my dad always says to me and I say to him as we part from each other after long intervals apart: "I love you Bruce; I love you Dad". The love and guidance of our parents and loved ones are etched deeply into immeasurable light and life.. After my mom's death, I've come to the simple, yet, clear awareness that the Nembutsu said from my parents' heart was already given to me as the the Buddha's Great Compassion prior to me ever thinking about it. Na Man Da Bu, Na Man Da Bu, Na Man Da Butsu. Until we meet again...
