Aloha Sangha members,

In March, we celebrated our 12th Annual Buddha Day sponsored by the Hawaii Association of International Buddhists (HAIB). This celebration of the birth of Sakyamuni Buddha was very special because Buddhist Sangha members from all corners of the island attended the celebration. It was so nice to see friends that we haven't seen for several years, as well as connecting with members from the Koyasan Shingon Mission of Hawaii, the Daifukuji Soto Mission, Kona Koyasan Daishiji Mission, Taishoji Soto Mission, Nechung Dorje Drayang Ling, and the Triratna Buddhist Community. Thank you to the Jr. YBA and everyone who helped create a beautiful Hanamido for the celebration.

On March 29, the BWA members went on an outing joined by members and friends of our Sangha to the Islander Sake Brewery at the Hapuna Golf Course. Besides learning how sake is brewed here in Hawaii, we all were offered the opportunity, if we wished, to taste Hawaiian sake.

Here we are now in the month of April, at the peak of the spring season, and the dreaded tax season. However, in April, we will be celebrating a very important Birthday. On Saturday, April 6, the BWA will be hosting a manju making class. We will be making our traditional Hanamatsuri manju and are inviting any Sangha members and families who would like to learn how to make our manju to join the BWA beginning at 8:00 a.m. on Saturday, April 6. It will be a great time for fellowship and to learn the art of manju making. Lunch will be provided, and you will be able to take some manju home for your enjoyment.

Also on Saturday, April 6, some of our Sangha members will be decorating our Hanamido for our Hanamatsuri (Buddha Day) service the following day. We are asking for donations of flowers for our Hanamido. It is said that flowers bloomed and gentle sweet rain fell when Siddhartha Gautama, who became Sakyamuni Buddha, was born in the beautiful Lumbini Gardens. Thus, we decorate the Hanamido (flower hall) in which a statue of the Baby Buddha is placed with beautiful flowers, and at our Hanamatsuri service, we come before the statue of the Baby Buddha in the Hanamido and pour sweet tea over the baby, thus depicting the day of the Buddha's birth.

On Sunday, April 7, at our Hanamatsuri service, as you pour sweet tea over the Baby Buddha, take a moment to show your gratitude to Sakyamuni Buddha, our teacher, master, spiritual guide, and friend, and make one wish for yourself and the world: to live each day to its fullest, to think pure and beautiful thoughts, to do good and kind deeds, and to help save all living beings.

Our Messy Yet Beautiful Lives Rev. Blayne Higa

We celebrate the birth of Shakyamuni Buddha during Spring when the world wakes from its wintry slumber. We eagerly welcome the return of light and life as the promise of renewal and new beginnings are kindled within our hearts. I can't help but think how the sacred story of the Buddha's birth is truly a lesson about spiritual transformation and hope.

The baby Buddha is said to have taken seven steps and declared, "In heaven above and on earth below, I am the most honored one. I shall dispel the suffering that fills this world." As we know, this probably didn't happen, but this story is rich in symbolism and meaning. The seven steps signify that he would go beyond the six realms of suffering and take the extra step into the awakened life of a Buddha. His announcement proclaims his future attainment of Buddhahood, and it also reveals the Buddha's wish to help all of us understand our own potential for enlightenment and liberation from spiritual suffering.



As we face life's many challenges, which can sometimes seem overwhelming, we should reflect on the Buddha's fundamental teaching of impermanence and how there is always the potential for transformation and change. Whatever situation or circumstance we find ourselves in is never permanent. Just like how happiness and good fortune are fleeting, so are sadness and misfortune. Impermanence means we are never stuck in life.

However, the Dharma does not give us ready-made answers to life's problems and challenges, rather the Teachings honor the unique circumstances of our lives by pushing us to go deeper into our own human experience enabling us to discover the answers within. This is a path of deep self-reflection and insight which reveals to us a life of profound creativity, compassion, and spiritual awakening.

In Shin Buddhism: Bits of Rubble Turn into Gold, Rev. Dr. Taitetsu Unno writes, "Since Buddhism is primarily descriptive and not prescriptive, each person is challenged to respond creatively to a given situation. Whatever the challenge may be—whether physical, mental, social, institutional, or historical—we face reality as it is, realizing our limited, imperfect,

vulnerable, and mortal self, which is sustained by boundless compassion. On that basis we proceed to respond creatively to the world, coming up with solutions unique to the problem at hand."

What a remarkable way of viewing and responding to life's challenges? Since we are not confined by rigid rules or prescriptive answers, our problem-solving can be flexible and creative. Critical and out-of-the-box thinking that Buddhism uplifts offers us realistic hope for living in this world of samsara.

The writer L.R. Knost shares an insightful reflection on the complex beauty of living, "Life is amazing. And then it's awful. And then it's amazing again. And in between the amazing and awful it's ordinary and mundane and routine. Breathe in the amazing, hold on through the awful, and relax and exhale during the ordinary. That's just living heartbreaking, soulhealing, amazing, awful, ordinary life. And it's breathtakingly beautiful."

This captures the essence of living in this ephemeral "world of dew" which is transforming from moment to moment always held within the dynamic embrace of great wisdom and compassion. This is why a verse from the Gatha *Gassho To Amida* declares, "In the clear bright morning sun, In the fading light of day, In the darkness of the night, I Gassho to Amida." Wherever we are and no matter what challenges we face, we are never alone or without hope.

As we celebrate the Buddha's birth, we also celebrate our awakening to unlimited possibilities and profound hope found in living our messy yet beautiful lives. Namo Amida Butsu.
