Aloha Sangha Members,

Summer has arrived, and we began June with our Boy Scouts Troop 59 sponsoring the Military Remembrance Service, a service to honor and remember the sacrifices of these brave men and women and their contribution to Peace in the world. Followed by our Father's Day service, to honor, and thank all of the fathers in our Sangha for their love and dedication to their families. We were also honored to have a father himself of two wonderful children, our current Bishop, Bishop Eric Matsumoto as our Dharma speaker. His visit was extra special, because he brought with him the original image of Amida that was housed in our Naijin, prior to the current image. There is a story behind both images, and although we have heard the story of how the second image came about, I personally didn't realize that there was a companion image. If anyone knows or has heard stories about the original image, please share it with Rev. Blayne or myself, it would be nice to put the pieces of the puzzle together and put it in the history books of Kona Hongwanji.

And the excitement continues into July... As we all know it's Obon season, and after a 3-year absence, we are excited to welcome the Sangha and the community to our Bon Dance on July 22. We will also be observing our Hatsubon service on this day. Hatsubon Service will begin at 4:00 p.m. followed by the Bon Dance at 6:00 p.m.

Because this day honors the memory of ancestors, especially parents, this year we will have a new addition to our Bon Dance event, we will be featuring "Memory Lanterns". We will have lanterns available at our Bon Dance, for people to write messages or remembrance of family members and friends who have passed on. These lighted lanterns will be placed in specified areas in and around the Temple. If you wish, you may take your lanterns home with you as you leave the Bon Dance.

In Japanese Buddhist communities in the United States, the Obon festival brings colorful Japanese cultural and religious traditions together. In the Jodo Shinshu tradition, It is also a time to remember and honor all those who have passed on before us, a time to remember and appreciate all that they have done for us (okagesama de), and a time to recognize the continuations of their deeds upon our lives.

In Jodo Shinshu another term for Obon is "Kangi e" A gathering of joy, so for me personally, When I see my lantern placed around the temple, I know in my heart that my late husband and parents are with me enjoying the Bon Dance. The light in the lantern also reminds me of Amida's all-encompassing compassion shining on us all. Please join me in lighting up our Bon Dance this year as we celebrate the Obon season.

Hope to see you at our Sunday Services, and at the Bon Dance, and let's all celebrate this this joyous night together, with memory lanterns, dancing, great food, and crafts available from various vendors.

An Obon Love Story Rev. Blayne Higa

At the heart of Obon is a story. A timeless story of love, devotion, and memory. We reflect on this story each year at the height of Summer when we celebrate the fullness of life in all its glory. We dance in endless circles to the rhythmic beat of taiko drums with our hands and feet telling heartfelt and healing stories of their own under the night sky illuminated by brightly colored lanterns.

The story of Obon comes from the *Ullambana Sutra* which describes how Mogallana, one of Shakyamuni Buddha's disciples, suffered over the death of his mother, feeling a deep sense of loss and regret. He worried that her lifelong devotion to him had been a barrier to her understanding and practicing the Dharma. However, the Buddha counseled Mogallana by asking him to reflect deeply upon this and he came to realize



that his mother's devotion to him was based on an unselfish love which naturally embodied the Buddha's path. With this profound insight into his mother's life, Mogallana danced with joy as his regret and sorrow were transformed into appreciation and gratitude for her love which made his life possible.

Mogallana's story offers us a profound lesson about life. That when we love we will also experience the loss of those we love. This is the inescapable truth of our lives. Through our own stories of love and loss, we come to appreciate the significance of this present life which is precious and unrepeatable. Because of our deep

connection to our ancestors, we are enabled to live. By remembering them, we gain new appreciation for the unique causes and conditions which sustain our lives.

During this festival of joyful memories, the veil separating us from our departed loved ones thins as we welcome them home into our hearts. This act of remembering is healing because we realize they have never left our side as ever-present companions and guides along our own life journey to the Buddha's world of awakening.

In the *Amida Sutra*, one of the three sacred scriptures of Shin Buddhism, we find the teaching of *Kue issho* which refers to how we will all meet together in the Pure Land of Enlightenment. In our saying of the Nembutsu we experience *Kue issho*—a profound oneness with our loved ones who have become part of the timeless working of great wisdom and compassion that sustains our lives. Our recitation of Namo Amida Butsu is an endless conversation with limitless Light and Life itself.

Years ago, observing my paternal grandmother's first Obon after her passing was bittersweet yet healing. Taking time to uplift her memory through this ancient ritual was a profound emotional and spiritual release. Recalling our shared story through the movement of my hands and feet, we danced together as we joined with others in the flowing ring of life. My heart quickened and slowed to the rhythm of drums as tears welled up and *Namandabu* rose from deep within.

It felt like I was finally able to let go after holding my breath for so many months since her death. My sorrow was transformed through the healing power of time and attention. My deepening appreciation for her and my profound gratitude for her continuing presence in my life found its natural expression in my voicing of the Nembutsu.

My grandmother and all my ancestors are together with me in the dynamic and inconceivable working of Namo Amida Butsu which has no beginning or end.

During the Obon season, we celebrate life and love, always entrusting ourselves to the all-inclusive wisdom and all-embracing compassion of Infinite Light and Life. Let's all take time to remember our own love stories that nurture and heal. Namo Amida Butsu.
