The Spiritual Foundation of Surrender Rev. Blayne Higa

In our fast-paced world it often feels like we are always trying to skip to the end of things. We have forgotten how necessary the actual journey is to our lives. A famous saying attributed to Chinese philosopher Lao-Tzu says, "A journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step." How we start a journey is immensely important because we realize the destination or goal we seek cannot be reached if we don't have a firm foundation from where to embark.

A story from Buddhist scripture illustrates this important lesson:

Once there was a wealthy but foolish man. When he saw a beautiful three-storied house of another man, he envied it and made up his mind to have one built just like it, thinking he was himself just as wealthy. He called and ordered a carpenter to build it.



The carpenter consented and immediately began to construct the foundation, the first story, the second story, and then did the third story. The wealthy man noticed this with irritation and said, "I don't want a foundation or a first story or a second story: I just want the beautiful third story. Build it quickly."

A foolish man always thinks only of the results, and is impatient without the effort that is necessary to get good results. No good can be attained without proper effort, just as there can be no third story without the foundation and the first and second stories.

This impatience has also influenced how we think of our spiritual journey. We tend to seek awakening without wanting to put in the work to get there. We want spirituality to be as simple as looking up a restaurant on Yelp. However, true spirituality is a lifelong journey of awakening to ourselves. The hardest yet most necessary thing we can do.

In the Pure Land path, our spiritual journey begins and ends with surrendering our ego. The result of this continual surrender is our heartfelt saying of Namo Amida Butsu or "I entrust in the dynamic working of all-inclusive wisdom and all-embracing compassion." Shin Buddhist writer Dr. Hideo Yonezawa shares, "Until now we have lived our life with nothing but ego. We have cherished our egos and placed ourselves ahead of everything. However, when we think carefully about our life, without things like the sun, the moon, water, air, grass, and trees, we would not be able to live for even an instant. Even our breathing and the beating of our

heart are not of our own power. When we come to realize that all things in the world are a working that transcends human beings, then we cannot help but unconditionally surrender ourselves to that working."

Only when we realize our lives are made possible through an inconceivable power beyond the self, is the foundation of our lives firmly established. We understand this power to be the dynamic working of Amida Buddha who embraces and never abandons us, leading us to the world of awakening. Secure in this knowledge, our entrusting heart is nurtured, and we are able to journey through life with deep confidence and profound spiritual freedom.

Gomonshu Kojun Ohtani, spiritual head of the Nishi Hongwanji writes, "Amida's liberation, the dynamic working that takes us in, becomes the great foundational support in our lives. No longer are we led astray by our wavering and unrelenting concerns, worries, and anxieties that have kept us unsettled without peace of mind. Instead, there arises within us an abundance of energy, vitality, and peace that fills our hearts and minds." This is the life-giving power of surrendering our ego which enables us to live authentically every moment of our lives. Each new day we have an opportunity to begin this journey of awareness and awakening to ourselves. This is how surrender is the first step along the Pure Land path. Namo Amida Butsu.

However, they are really one because a true understanding of the Buddhist Path is only complete when there is a unity of Buddha, Dharma, AND Sangha. Our journey of self-discovery is enabled through the good spiritual friendships found within a community of practice. Let's explore the power of Sangha to nurture our spiritual lives as a community of fellow travelers.

Rev. Blayne Higa was born and raised in Hilo, Hawaii and is a graduate of Waiakea High School. He holds a Master of Divinity degree from the Institute of Buddhist Studies in Berkeley, California with a focus on Shin Buddhist ministry and chaplaincy. Rev. Blayne is currently the Resident Minister of the Kona Hongwanji Buddhist Temple. He previously served as Assisting Minister of the Moiliili Hongwanji Buddhist Temple and as Assistant Chaplain for the Pacific Buddhist Academy in Honolulu, Hawaii.

Before entering the ministry, he spent over 17 years in state government and in non-profit fundraising. He holds a Master of Public Administration degree as well as a Certificate in Urban and Regional Planning from the University of Hawaii at Manoa. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Willamette University in Salem, Oregon.

Rev. Blayne is the Chair of the Committee on Social Concerns and Ministerial Training Committee for the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii. He also serves on the Board of the American Civil Liberties Union of Hawaii and Vibrant Hawaii. He is a past President of the Moiliili Hongwanji Board of Directors and former First Vice President of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii.

Rev. Blayne received Tokudo ordination in 2012 and Kyoshi certification in 2018 from the Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji-ha.


